UXBRIDGE TP COUNCIL

The Council met on Saturday, May 23rd at Goodwood, with members all present, Reeve W. G. Cassie in the chair.

The following communications were read:

From Mr. Croskery, District Agricultural representative, asking council to consider a different method of financing school fairs, whereby the council would furnish the prize money instead of as at present being contributed by each school board of school competing as it is raised by tax anyway. The above request to take effect in 1926.

Clerk was instructed by council not to renew hall license until it became necessary that it was wanted for some entertainment.

The council did not seem to favor

Mr. Croskery's request and there will not be any steps taken along that line at present.

I. H. Borinsky of Goodwood, came before the council requesting permission to place a gasoline tank on the highway near his store. The request was granted.

Henry White waited on the council requesting that they open up a sideline between lots 10 and 11, con. 3 which would give the farmers to the east a road to his mill. Council gave same considerable consideration after which a vote was taken, the result being not in favor of opening the road, as it was considered the cost would be heavy.

On motion of Messrs. Lee and Glaspell, a bylaw was given its several readings and passed, authorizing the Reeve and Clerk to sign certain contracts with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, whereby certain ratepayers of the

Township may have a supply of electrical energy.

Court of Revision

Council resolved into a Court of Revision of the Assessment Roll for 1925. There was only one appeal, that of a dog having died and a few minor changes caused by property transfer. All were disposed of, on motion of Messrs. Lewis and Glaspell, the Court arose and the Assessment Roll was confirmed for 1925.

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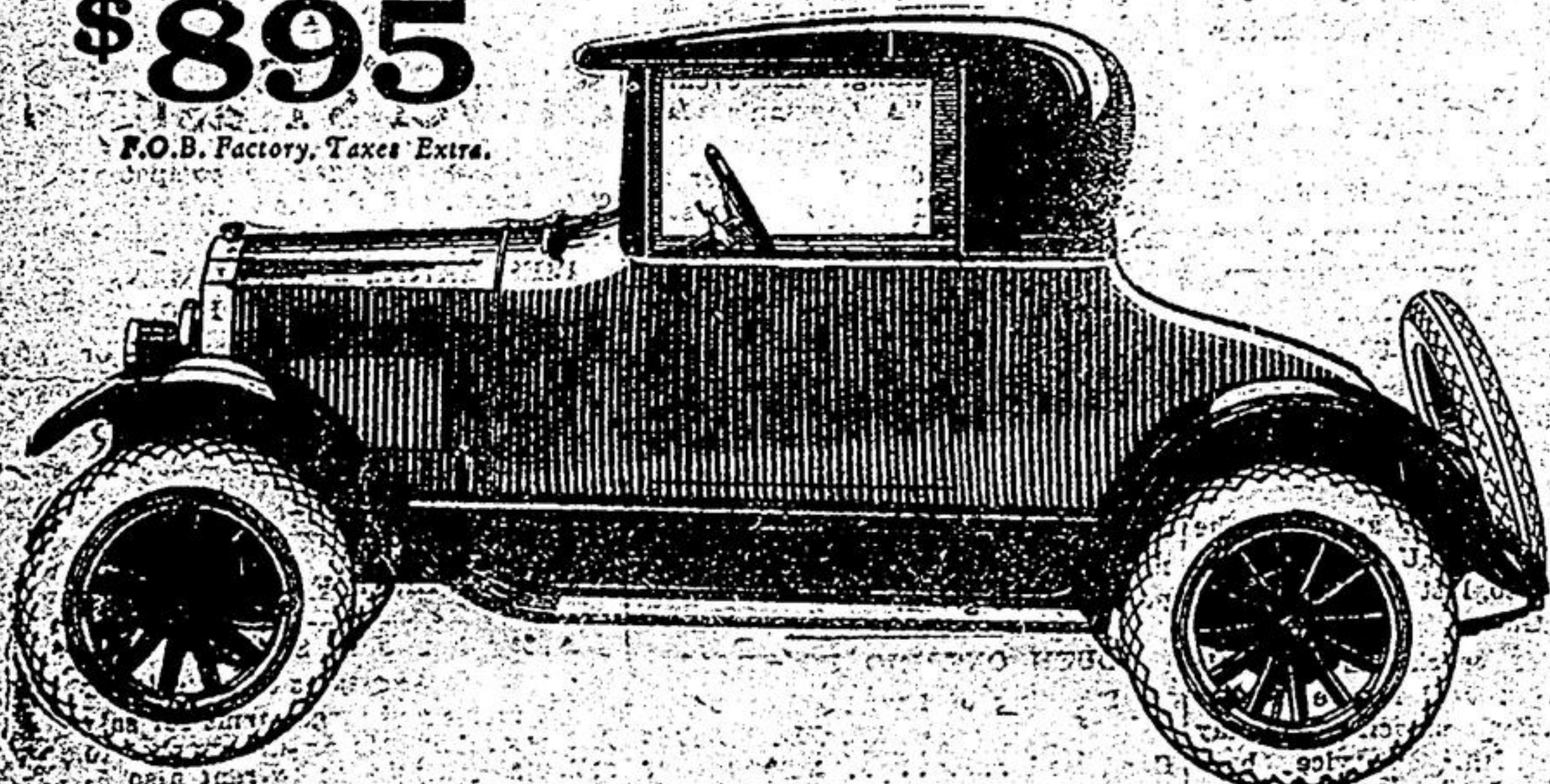
