EDITORIAL COMMENT

The town of Aurora is making a strong bid for the building of a new piece of provincial highway through a portion of Whitchurch Township, leading to that town. The idea of this movement, of course, is to divert business into Aurora. In order to advance their claims in this matter a strong deputation this week waited upon Hon. Geo. S. Henry in Toronto, to impress the minister with the need for such a road.

This step calls for prompt action on the part of Stouffville and all the farmers living along the townline between here and Yonge street, who are anxious that any provincial road in Whitchurch should be built on the townline from the sixth of Markham, straight through to Yonge street. Already \$15,000 has been spent on this road, which would be practically wasted if it is not completed. As the government will only construct a limited amount of road in any municipality, it behoves our people to see that the road to Yonge street along the townline is assumed first thing, and not allow the government to build a road for the purpose of diverting business into Aurora.

It is expected that a similar deputation which waited upon Hon. Mr. Henry in the interests of building this road, which will be practically upon the minister within a few days, probably headed by the reeve of Stouffville and other officials who are interested in a through road to Yonge street from Stouffville.

RURAL PLAY COMPETITION

The first Rural Play Competition to be put on in York County will be held in the Masonic Hall, Richmond Hill, June 18th.

Three different communities will take part in this competition which is a part of the York County Junior Farmers' program for 1925, the idea being to take advantage of the competition spirit existing between the different communities, giving them a chance to display their talents along the line of Amateur Theatricals, and also to carry on educational work in this branch of their activities.

The clubs taking part are: Victoria Square—"The Teeth of the Gift Horse"; Ellesmere Community Club—"The Ghost Story"; Woodbridge Club—"Just like a Woman".

These plays are all one act comedies. Besides the plays each community is also contributing musical and vocal talent between the acts, which along with the theatrical performances, should go to make up a very interesting and amusing evening's entertainment.

THE VALUE OF A GOOD TOWN BAND

The Whitby Chronicle is kind enough to make the following reference to Stouffville band:

"The Town of Stouffville, much smaller than Whitby, has a band with 35 or 40 members, who have uniforms, fine instruments and a paid leader. The band was heard at the Brooklyn fair on May 25th, when the general impression was that the organization was a credit to the town and to the members collectively and individually. The bandmaster claims that the band is a success because it is loyally supported by the citizens and the town council, and because it receives many engagements owing to its excellence."

A band is one of the best organizations any town can have, and the citizens should co-operate with the leader and members of the Whitby Citizens' Band in their efforts to secure funds to purchase uniforms, and to make other general improvements which will make the organization second to none in the county. It is just possible that if the band were successful in raising a certain amount this summer for uniforms, the town council might be induced to make a contribution.

In many places the bandmaster is paid by the council, who assume control of the instruments and take a general interest in building up and maintaining a first-class band."

MARKHAM T.P. COUNCIL

Markham Township Council met in their modest municipal quarters over the hotel sheds in Unionville, on Monday, June 1st. All the members were present, and Reeve Gohn presided. The other members of this August body are: 1st Deputy Reeve, J. R. Campbell, 2nd Deputy R. L. Stiver, Councillors Jas. S. Honey and E. J. Jarvis.

Council first met as a Court of Revision reported elsewhere in this issue, and then disposed of a somewhat light docket.

Mr. Holdcroft, who was the successful tenderer for building Hood's bridge on the 10th con., appeared before the council, stating that he had made an error in computing the concrete work 100 yards too little, and asked that he be relieved of his contract, or else be allowed \$1000 extra, or \$10 per yard. The council relieved him of his contract but told him that he had forfeited his deposit cheque for \$100. The reeve was empowered to see the next lowest tenderers and make contract with most satisfactory.

Kenneth Noble wrote saying he would take \$50 damages for injuries he received while drawing stone for township front pit, lot 17, con. 3.

A resolution was passed that the claim of Mr. Noble be referred to the Globe Indemnity Co., with which the township has insurance.

Deputy Reeve Campbell, seconded by Councillor Jarvis, introduced a resolution to make special grants to improve the 8th con., Markham, north of Markham village, and the Elgin Mills road. Mr. Campbell pointed out that on account of the heavy traffic on these roads it was impossible to keep them up on the \$100 a mile allotted to the roads in the township. The 8th con. needed a lot of ditching and shaping at certain points and not very much metal.

The reeve thought Mr. Jarvis should go ahead with the work as far as his money allowance would go and then ask the Council for more. Mr. Jarvis said that if the work

was to be done it must be done this month as after that the farmers would be too busy on their farms and teams and help could not be procured. He pointed out that in the front of the township teams could be secured at any time, but not so in his division.

The following resolution was passed: "Whereas an award in connection with the Allen ditch, lot 11, con. 5 and 6, requires that the work set out in the award be completed by June 1st, 1925, and whereas said work has not been commenced, be it resolved that the Engineer be instructed to call for tenders for carrying out of said work so that contracts for same may be entered into and work proceeded with and

that the seal of the corporation be attached to this resolution."
