"BY FAITH YE ARE HEALED"

The day of spiritual healing of the sick, the making of the lame to walk and the blind to see is not passed if the story concerning one John Eby of Toronto, who owns a farm south of Markham Township, counts for anything.

Eby's experience as a divine healer reached a Stouffville citizen last week in a very realistic fashion. Mr. Elias Stover, a resident of Church street, was compelled to give up work on Tuesday owing to a severe attack of inflammatory rheumatism in his right arm and shoulder. He could not raise his arm, and suffered intense pain. On Friday he determined to visit Mr. Eby, they being acquainted and Mr. Stover having followed his friend's doings with some interest before hand. When he got in the car to make the journey to Toronto it was necessary to rest his arm on a pillow to alleviate the pain. On arrival at Mr. Eby's home in East Toronto, Mr. Stover had his coat removed, and Mr. Eby merely laid his hands on. The pain was more intense than ever for just a few moments, but Mr. Eby said this was due to pain passing out of the system, and out it went. Mr. Stover got up from his chair, with actually no pain, and was able to put on his overcoat, and raise his arm to his head which he could not do a moment before. The above is his own statement to the Tribune. He stated also that he had great faith in Mr. Eby because he had known him for years as an honest, upright individual. Mr. Eby takes no money for the alleged miracles he performs. Telling his own story he says that a few years ago he saw hand-writing on the palm of his hand, but unlike the wicked king of old, he was able to decipher it for himself. This is what it said: "Heal the People." It was a withered hand that bore the words and from that day he was able to use freely, the otherwise lifeless member.

Mr. Eby was naturally startled by the inscription, and said: "What will I tell them? Again the writing read: 'Tell them it is God's power.'"

Since that time Mr. Eby claims he has restored many to health and has a bundle of crutches at his home to testify for those who came lame and went away leaping. He states that through God's grace he has even restored sight to the blind.

Mr. Eby is described as an honorable man, a true christian, and he takes no credit to himself for this gift of healing that is worked through him. Mr. Stover is one of our most respected citizens and surely a miracle was performed on him!

EAST YORK WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

On Friday, June 11th, the fine new Oddfellow's Hall at Agincourt was the scene of a very interesting and successful event, when over a hundred delegates of the East York District Women's Institute met in their annual convention.

The ten branches, which comprise the district, were well represented. The local branch at Agincourt provided a dainty and bountiful luncheon in the commodious lower room of the hall, to which over one hundred and fifty guests sat down.

The afternoon session was one of interest and real worth. Miss Coulson of Wexford Girls' Institute, spoke on girls' work, and Miss Petch of Markham, gave an account of the recent girls' conference at Guelph, both addresses being very interesting. Miss Powell of Pickering, a member of the Federation Board, conducted a question drawer, also spoke on Federation, both of which were very much appreciated.

Taking part in the musical program were: Mrs. Davison of Unionville, Mrs. H. Dix and Mrs. Hewitt of Dakeview branch, also two tiny tots (Misses Preston and Shaw) of Agincourt, all of which delighted those present. Mrs. Shaw of Agincourt, gave a very fine reading.

The special feature of the day was an address on "Laws," by Mrs. Col. Lang of Toronto. The speaker, in a most clear and convincing manner, pointed out the marked improvement which has taken place in recent years, both in Dominion and Provincial statutes, of interest to women and children; at the same time startling her audience with an account of the gross injustice to women and children of many of the laws which still remain on our statute books, and she urged her hearers to acquaint themselves more fully with the laws which govern them.

The committee on resolution was convened by Mrs. (Rev.) Rae, Unionville, and a number of practical resolutions were received and adopted.

A pleasing feature of the afternoon was the presentation by Mrs. G.A.M. Davison, on behalf of East York district, of a life membership certificate to the President, Mrs. I. Graves.

The Agincourt ladies proved delightful hostesses, and again at tea time, extended their hospitality to all present, when over two hundred guests sat down to what should be called a high tea, and expressions could be heard on all sides to the effect that this was one of the most delightful, interesting and helpful district annual meetings ever held in

LATE ROBERT GRAHAM

Robert Goodfellow Graham, the dean of Canadian horsemen on this continent, passed peacefully away at his old home, "Cairnbrogie," Clarendon, on Sunday, June 14th, in his 65th year. Mr. Graham comes of a family who have made the Clydesdale the leading draft horse in Canada. His uncle, Richard Ward, imported the first Clydesdale, stallion to Canada, and his father, the late Richard Graham, was also a noted importer and breeder. On the death of his father, Robert then in his 19th year, took up the management of the farm at Clarendon, and made the first of his many visits to Scotland, bringing home with him the Clydesdale stallion, "Manfield," a horse which made a great reputation for himself in the show ring and in the stud, and the firm of Graham Bros. was formed, William, a younger brother, going into partnership with Robert, and later the youngest brother, Thomas, joined the firm. With Robert at the head of the firm, Graham Brothers soon became the most noted Clydesdale and Hackney breeders and importers on the continent.

When Canada entered into the South African war, Robt. Graham was selected by the late Senator Beifit to look after the purchase of horses for the Canadian transport and artillery, and, as Major, Graham he was in charge of the transportation of several hundred horses to Cape Town, S.A. After returning from South Africa, he formed a partnership with Walter Renfrew, formerly of Stouffville, under the name of Graham & Renfrew, at Bedford Park and this partnership continued until increasing land values tempted the firm to sell their farm on Yonge St. in 1912, and the partnership was

dissolved.

Quiet, unassuming, and always a gentleman, Robt. Graham won a host of friends all over Canada, and with his brothers, his name has been synonymous for honorable dealing.

He is survived by four brothers, Wm. and Thos. (Graham Bros.) of Clarendon, David of Pickering and Geo. of B.C., also two sisters, Margaret at home and Elizabeth of Montana.

The pall bearers were Robt. Miller of Stouffville, J. Boag, Queensville, "Bud" Tisdale, Beaverton, Jas. Torrance, Markham, Peter Chester, Manchester, and Wm. Dryden, Brooklin. The funeral, which was very largely attended, was held Wednesday last, a simple, impressive service at the home in Clarendon, and interment in the family plot at Grace Church cemetery, Markham.
