EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Municipal Act, which formerly made it necessary for a municipal candidate to resign as school trustee ten clear days before nomination, has been amended to allow the candidate to qualify if he resigns three clear days before the nomination.

A wheat yield of 350,000,000 bushels for Canada in 1925 is estimated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in a crop report issued recently. The figure is based upon the acreage of last year, and according to reports received by the bureau to date the area sown this year is approximately the same as last. A yield of 350,000,000 bushels would be ten million bushels above the average of the past five years. Splendid rains have fallen this year during the critical period of growth and should favorable conditions continue the yield may well be considerably larger than that indicated. "The practical elimination of the United States as an exporting country next year," states the report, "points to a likelihood of the maintenance of good prices from which Canada should benefit to the extent of her exportable surplus."

Walkerton Telescope: "More and more it seems that the old-fashioned custom of spending Sunday quietly and going to church and Sunday school is being thrown aside by many otherwise careful-living people in favor of the pleasures of the auto. MARKHAM TP. COUNCIL

Council met at Unionville on Monday, July 6th, with all the members present and Reeve Gonn in the chair. Communications were received from:

Chas. Bachley, claiming damage for automobile accident on Whitchurch townline between Gormley and Yonge street. He claimed his car had dropped into a hole in the road and upset, wrecking the auto. Mr. Bachley was badly shaken up and bruised but no bones broken. The car was a Reo, 1914 model.

The Department of Public Highways sent a summary statement of the road expenditure for 1924 and the Government subsidy to be allowed thereon as follows:

Mr. R. J. Rogers, Agricultural representative for York County, wrote, asking for a grant of \$20 for school fair.

Jonathan Nigh was heard asking the council to put in a culvert at his lane. The highway commission had drawn the gravel for same and ready to commence work when the 6th from Unionville north was abandoned and the engineer ordered the work stopped. The ditches of the hill also needed cleaning out to protect the roadway from washing out. The council agreed to place a new culvert in position if Mr. Nigh would supply the pipe, and instructed Road Superintendent Thompson to have the ditches opened and put in the culvert.

Abraham Raymer was heard asking for an increased grant for graveling the 9th con.

A deputation from Gormley, headed by Deputy Reeve Leary of Whitchurch was heard. They asked for a grant of \$500 (the same as Whitchurch had made) to gravel the townline between the 3rd con. and Yonge street. Mr. Leary explained that there were some dangerous spots caused by washouts. Mr. Homer Wilson was also heard, as was Elder Hulse and Mr. Geo. Hoover. The reeve and Mr. Campbell were appointed a commission to go over the road and report at next meeting of council.

The reeve explained that he let the contract as authorized to H.H. Powers, to build bridge at lot 17, con. 9, and this resolution was passed

confirming same.

Moved by Mr. that the tender of H.H. Powers for constructing bridge at lot 17, con. 10, at \$4770 be accepted, and the seal of the corporation be attached to this resolution.

Grants were made to Markham Agricultural Society of \$100 and to Markham School Fair of \$20.

The reeve reported that he had purchased two new road scrapers for \$80.
