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BEQUESTS EXCEED

VALUE OF ESTATE

The United Church of Canada at Stouffville will benefit considerably by the will of the late Rev. George Washington, one of retired citizens who passed away here on July 8th. The following are the bequests made by this kindly old gentleman, who rendered liberal financial assistance to the local church during his lifetime here:

Margaret S. Southcombe, sister \$1,000; Elizabeth A. Washington, sister, \$500; Stouffville Methodist Sunday School \$50; endowment fund Victoria College, Toronto, \$1,000; General Missionary Society of the Methodist Church \$200; superannuation fund, Methodist church \$200; church fund, Stouffville \$200; W. M. S. Stouffville Methodist church \$400; George A. Washington, nephew \$500; Ezra Washington, brother \$400; W. M. S. Stouffville, residue.

As the total estate amounts to \$3,623 and the bequests total \$4,450, the legatees will be reduced proportionately excepting those to his sisters which are to be provided in full, according to the will.
