**WHITCHURCH TP. COUNCIL**

Whitchurch Township Council met at the Township Hall, Vandorf, Saturday, August 1st, with all members in attendance. Communications were presented and read: Messrs. G. S. Henry and J. S. Martin, Provincial Ministers of Highways and Agriculture, drawing attention of Council to The Noxious Weeds Act, which provides, "That Overseers of Highways or other Municipal Officers charged with the care of highways shall see that all noxious weeds growing upon the highways are cut down or destroyed at the proper time to prevent the ripening of their seed", and requesting that this provision of the Act be enforced. E. A. James, engineer to the York Highways Commission, stating that by Order in Council of the Ontario Government, the road allowance between lots 30 and 31, con. 4, and between lots 95 and 96, con. 1, had been returned to the Council as Township roads. Donald, Mason, & Foulds, solicitors for Mr. F. Mahon, objecting to Mr. Ash being allowed to occupy part of unused portion of road allowance at Wilcox Lake, as per Township lease to him. George Hood presented claim for sheep injured by dogs. Resolutions were passed instructing the Treasurer to pay the following bills:

- Granting the sum of \$75 for purchase of culvert pipe for ditch on north townline between 8th and 9th concession, providing Township of East Gwillimbury grant a like amount. In consideration of the communication regarding cutting of weeds on highways it was pointed out that instructions to road overseers in the Township, have always directed them to reserve sufficient time to cut weeds on the roads. Bylaws were passed providing for the levy of general township school rates and requiring a rate of four mills on the dollar and the levy of sufficient rates to pay the several amounts asked for by the various boards of school trustees of the Township, and the levy of five mills on the dollar for general Township purposes, and of seven mills on the dollar for the payment of County taxes, amounting for this year to \$16,746.70. Council adjourned to meet on Saturday, August 29th.
