

UXBRIDGE TWP. COUNCIL

Uxbridge Township Council met at Goodwood, Saturday, August 15th. Members all present; Reeve W. G. Casse in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Communications from Hydro Electric Commission with copies of contract between Mrs. H. Dewart and Geo. N. Morang and the Hydro Electric Commission.

From the Hon. G. S. Henry, Minister of Highways, and Hon. John S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture, calling attention to the clause in the Noxious Weed Act, which provides that overseers of highways or other municipal officers charged with the care of highways, shall see that all noxious weeds growing upon the highways are cut down at the proper time to prevent ripening of the seed.

From Hon. John S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture, answer to clerks query as to method of procedure re purchase of an Athletic Field, also stating that grant would be made as soon as the Act had been complied with and an officer of the Department was able to make a report to this effect.

From Thos. Hirst, Brooklyn, R.R.1 claiming damage to his car of \$50 or 60, on S.T.L., same was forwarded by clerk to the Globe Indemnity Co. From the Hydro Electric Commission asking permission to erect a wood pole power line on E.T.

Dr. R. E. Darling presented a petition to council, signed by 90 ratepayers of School Section No. 7, praying council to pass a bylaw in conformity with the Community Halls Act of 1920 for the establishment of an Athletic Field just west of the Village of Goodwood. The Act requires half the number of ratepayers to sign such petition, but it was signed by very nearly 100 per cent of ratepayers.

Mr. Todd seconded by Mr. Lewis, moves that the petition just received be placed on file for consideration and solicitors approval. Carried.

Mr. Glaspell seconded by Mr. Lewis moves that the Reeve, Deputy Reeve, Mr. Todd and the Clerk be a committee re the purchase of Athletic Field. Carried.

The Treasurer's Semi-Annual report of receipts and expenditures from the first day of January to the 15th day of August, 1925 was received.

Mr. Todd gave notice that he will at next meeting of council move for leave to introduce a bylaw for the purpose of establishing an Athletic Field as per petition presented to council.

On motion of Messrs. Glaspell and Lewis, a bylaw was passed, striking the several rates for the current year as follows:—General County purposes 7-10 mills; general Township purposes 7 mills; County roads 2-5-10 mills; lieu of Statute Labor a rate of 2 mills; general School rate 6-3-10 mills. The clerk was also authorized to strike an equalized rate upon School Section No. 2 and 4, to pay interest and debenture, No. 1 for said school sections. The Trustees rates of the various schools of the Township was struck according to the requirements of the different school boards.
