EDITORIAL COMMENT

In South Huron, R. J. McMillen will run in the coming federal election as a U.F.O., against T. McMillan, who is in the field as a liberal. The two candidates are brothers.

In connection with the judicial appointments in Ontario, James E. Thompson added to the list of county judges comes from Araprior, and is made judge of the County of Ontario

Editorial writing is a fine art, says Hon. Duncan Marshall. The Mail and Empire likens Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King to a rat and Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen to a weasel. This recalls the old song, "Pop Goes the Weasel."

Lyman A. Kennedy of Agincourt, returning officer for South York, has issued his proclamation for the election in that riding. The nominations will be held in Heather Hall, Agincourt, on Thursday, Oct. 22nd, and the election on October 29th. Mr. H. Clark, of Agincourt, is Mr. Kennedy's election clerk.

Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King has announced the appointment of Vincent Massey, president of the Massey-Harris Farm Implement Co., as a member of his cabinet, without portfolio. This will be a real acquisition to the Liberal cabinet, and the political opponents of the government seem to have no complaint to make against Mr. Massey, who comes from an old Liberal family.

A mass meeting of Liberals of Ontario riding will be held in the town hall, Whitby, on Saturday, the 19th inst., at 2 p.m., to choose a candidate for the coming Federal election. The meeting will be addressed by Hon. Geo. P. Graham, L. O. Clifford, M.P., W. E. N. Sinclair, K.C., M.P.P. Ontario Liberal Leader, and others. South Ontario is now known as Ontario, as there is no North Ontario, it having been taken into the Muskoka district.

It is now fairly definitely decided that the farmers will not put a candidate in the field this election in North York, to oppose Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, the Liberal candidate. This means that it will likely be a straight Liberal and Conservative fight, as the opposition party met in convention at Newmarket on Wednesday this week to select a candidate.

September the 1st, the Reformer newspaper and job-printing business in Oshawa and the real estate connected therewith, officially changed ownership, the entire property passing into the hands of the Mundy Printing Co. which was recently incorporated under an Ontario charter. The President of the new company is Charles W. Mundy and the Secretary Arthur R. Alloway, both of whom were actively identified with the Reformer business up to the time of its sale by them to Messrs. J. C. Ross and J. Ewart McKay, September 1, 1922. The National Trust Co. which has been in charge of the business since March 7th, pending settlement of the Reformer's affairs, has also agreed to the transfer of the business.

In connection with the project of the C.N.R. by which electric railway service will be attempted a trial run of an electrical unit took place recently from Hamilton to Allandale and back again. The unit was of the small type which handles a baggage car. A Diesel motor is used in developing power. Fuel of crude oil is used to drive the generator that produces the power necessary to run the train. The units are of two types, one a small type carrying 56 passengers and the other an articulated unit carrying 128 passengers. It is expected that this will herald a new era in railway service. It is estimated that the cost of operating will be cut 50 per cent in comparison with steam. On the run recently made the operating cost exclusive of wages, amounting to two cents a mile.
