THE TWO LEADERS

Born in the same year and in adjoining counties of the Province of Ontario, graduating from the same university about the same time, and entering the House of Commons in the same general election—these are coincidences that lead to exceptional interest in the destinies of the major party leaders in the present campaign of Federal general elections in Canada.

Premier King, Liberal leader, and Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Conservative opposition, were born in the year 1874, were graduated from the University of Toronto within a year of each other, Mr. King in 1895 and Mr. Meighen in 1896, and were elected to parliament for the first time in 1898. Mr. King was born at Berlin, (now Kitchener, Ont.) and Mr. Meighen at Anderson, Perth County, Ont.

Premier King was first elected from the constituency of North Waterloo, Ont., in 1908, with a majority of 263. At the same general election Mr. Meighen was given a majority of 250 in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. In the general election of 1911 Mr. King was defeated in North Waterloo and Mr. Meighen was returned from Portage with a majority of 675 votes.

In a bye-election at Portage in July, 1913, Mr. Meighen was returned by acclamation.

In the war time general election of 1917, Mr. Meighen was elected from Portage la Prairie by a majority of 3,635, while in the same election Mr. King was defeated in North York.

Mr. King was chosen as leader of the Liberal Party in 1919, and in October of that year was returned by acclamation at a bye-election in the County of Prince (P.E.I.) At the general election of 1921, Mr. King was elected from North York with a majority of 1,055, and returned in the following January at the bye-election by acclamation, while Mr. Meighen was defeated in Portage by Harry Leader, (Progressive), who led by 177 votes. Mr. Meighen, however, was elected in Grenville at a bye-election in 1922 by acclamation.

Present campaign finds Mr. King again candidate in North York and Mr. Meighen returning to Portage la Prairie, his first constituency, to stand for election.

Headway is now being made with the work of draining the Holland Marsh, which has been under discussion for a great many years. The dipper lifts two yards and a half each lift, and in timing its operations it was found that the time required from trip to trip was twenty-five seconds. Two lifts per minute is said to be the average speed.

Richmond Hill's fine new fire truck consisting of combination pump, chemical and hose outfit, arrived last week from Tilsonburg, where it was built by The Lorne Tractors Co., Limited. The new equipment, which cost \$3,297, was given an interesting tryout by Chief Mills and some of his volunteer helpers on its arrival, a stream thrown about 100 feet into the air testifying to its capabilities.

News of the death of Geo. H. Brown on Friday of last week, at the home of his sister, came as a distinct shock to his numerous friends in Newmarket. It was generally known that he was in poor health when he left Newmarket, giving up the management of the King George hotel, a few weeks ago, and it was sincerely hoped that the change and relief from the cares of office would bring about complete restoration of health. But it was not to be. He will be missed by all in town and countryside who came to know him and respect him for his fine character and sterling worth. For fifteen years he was the efficient manager of the King George hotel.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH

An accident with fatal results cast a gloom over the neighborhood of Keswick last week. While the men were threshing for Robt. Fairbairn, about two miles north of Keswick on Wednesday, Mr. Fairbairn was struck in the head by a corner of a plank. He was not knocked out at the time and it was thought that he was not seriously injured, but after a time he fell unconscious and Dr. Noble of Sutton was called. He was taken to the hospital at Newmarket and an operation was performed by a specialist from Toronto, but the man died during the night. The cause of death was hemorrhage of the brain. Much sympathy is expressed for Mrs. Fairbairn and the family.
