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WELL KNOWN BAPTIST MINISTER VISITED FORMER CHARGE

The Rev. J. B. Moore is well known to many of the old-timers of Stouffville and the surrounding district. More than fifty years ago he came to assume the pastorate of the Pickering church, and since then served at Whitevale, the Markham First church, the Markham Second church, the Stouffville church, as well as at Second King Baptist church, in King Township. He was also the means of starting the Baptist work in Goodwood, and of doing considerable work in the evangelistic field. Mr. Moore is at present the oldest living Baptist minister in the Convention of Ontario and Quebec, and thousands have had reason to give thanks for the influence that his life has brought to them. He is at present 53 years of age, but is still active and preaches occasionally. The Markham Second (sixth line) and Baker's Hill Baptist Churches heard him with great pleasure last Sunday large numbers being on hand at both churches.

Mr. Ralph Lott who was beaten and robbed of \$256 at his home on the 7th of October, is just recovered from the brutal assault, and returned to his home last Saturday from the Oshawa hospital.

Up to the present time the police have found no clue to the robbery, the robbers evidently having made a clean get-away. The old saying that things are never so bad, but that they might be worse, is even true in Mr. Lott's misfortune. It so happened that only a week before the robbery, his brother, Hiram, came out from Toronto and persuaded Ralph to transfer \$4,500 of cash, held in the house to the bank. Even this was done reluctantly, as Ralph Lott, being of an eccentric nature, had no confidence in our banking institutions. Had this transfer not been made, his fortune would have been wiped out entirely on the fatal night.

If this is accomplished, it is felt that a needed requirement to the town equipment will be met and the building may be completed with nothing more than could be desired.

On Saturday, Nov. 7th, 1925, a sad and unexpected death took place at Glasgow, when Mrs. Franklin Forsyth passed away under very distressing circumstances. Although not in good health Mrs. Forsyth was about as usual, she suffered from goitre, but, we understand, had been assured only a few weeks ago, by specialist that there was no immediate danger. She expired about 11 o'clock in the morning before medical aid could reach her.

Mrs. Forsyth was a native of Flesherston, Grey County, and came to Glasgow as a maiden to teach school. Here she met her husband to whom she was married in 1896, but who predeceased her some years. She was Mr. Forsyth's second wife. Mrs. Forsyth was born on Dec. 3rd, 1863, being 62 years of age. Her maiden name was Annie L. Wright, and she is survived by an only daughter, (Mary), Mrs. Robt. Thompson of Hamilton, also by two step sons, Fred, Agricultural representative at Preston and Jos. at home on the farm. Mrs. Forsyth is also survived by four brothers, namely: John of Flesherston, Mr. Justice Wright of Toronto, David Wright, principal of Dundalk High school, and Robt. Wright of Hanover, Inspector of public schools.

The funeral was held on Thanksgiving Day, divine service being held at the late home, after which the remains were taken to Flesherston for interment.
