In the best turnout in sod, Lorne Weldrick was 1st, and in stubble, H. Feeney.
A. E. Kennedy won F.D.N. Reesor's consolation prize for the best plowed land not otherwise winning a prize, and Wilfred Timbers the sweepstakes for the best plowed land in the field.
