## NO ARRESTS IN LOTT ROBBERY

Word reached Stouffville last Thursday that one or two arrests had been made in connection with the robbery and assault made on Ralph Lott during the last week in October at his home on the 7th of Pickering when nearly \$1000 was stolen from his house. Early this week The Tribune got into touch with Chief Constable Taylor at Whitby, only to learn that the report is quite incorrect, and that there is no foundation for such stories as are going around.

Constable Taylor is working on the case, and so far has been unable to cast suspicion on any local parties for the robbery. "Would you say that arrests are likely to be made soon?" asked The Tribune. "No I couldn't even suggest that unless something new turns up," replied the Chief.

As stated last week Mr. Lott is quite recovered, and is home from the hospital.

Interment was made in Melville cemetery.

He was a good Christian citizen, a kind neighbor and friend, and a faithful member of Melville church.
