TWO CHICKEN THIEVES GET ONG PRISON TERMS

Frederick Josephs and Charles Harnden both of Uxbridge, appeared before his Honor Judge Ruddy, at a special sitting of the court at Whitby last week, when they were charged with the theft of 164 fowls the property of farmers of the Townships of Uxbridge and Reach, and of which they stole during the months of Aug. and Sept. A number of these birds were stolen in the southern part of Uxbridge Township.

The stolen fowl were traced to the St. Lawrence market, Toronto, where they had been disposed of under the name of H. Wilson, Greenbank, by the accused men and for which they received \$134.97, which is far below their actual value, some of the birds being prize fowl.

Josephs was also charged with theft of radio and phonograph parts the property of the Gold Medal Co., Uxbridge, some of which were found on the premises occupied by Josephs, and being of the value of over ten dollars.

In answer to the charges a plea of guilty was given by both accused; Josephs having withdrawn his plea of "not guilty" given in Uxbridge before Magistrate Hamilton at the preliminary hearing.

On sentencing the accused Judge Ruddy gave them a stern lecture and said because of their having no previous record, a sentence would be given them, which was far lighter than that which could be imposed for this class of offence, but that the sentence would be one that he hoped would be a lesson for others that might be wont to try this method of getting money.

The sentence of the court was: Josephs 1st charge, 2 years less 1 day; 2nd charge, 2 years less 1 day; 3rd charge 3 months; 4th charge, 1 month, concurrently with first sentence.

Harnden, 1st charge 2 years less 1 day; 2nd charge, 2 years less 1 day; 3rd charge 1 month, concurrent with the first sentence.

The arrests of Josephs and Harnden were effected by Provincial Constable Taylor, County Constable Vanstone, Whitby; Constable McCully, Blackwater and Chief Hockley, Uxbridge.

LOCUST HILL

However, the following committee was appointed to push the matter and secure contracts: Will Turner, O. R. Purcell, A. Parks, E. O. Daniels, P. R. Wilson, F. E. N. Reesor, Arthur Lapp, Harry Lapp and Ira Reesor. The line, if built, will be from Markham village and may be run via either the Markham and Scarboro townline, the Box Grove sideroad, out Wellington street, Church street, or Grove's sideroad from Mount Joy, on whichever route the necessary or most takers can be secured.
