As a reminder that municipal elections are upon us again, the council in regular session on Friday evening passed the customary bylaw providing for the holding of a nomination on Monday, Dec. 28, between the hours of twelve and one o'clock noon, for the nomination of a reeve, councillors, three school trustees and a cemetery commissioner. In case more than the necessary number qualify, the election will be held the first Monday in January.

The proposal to change the hour of nomination as suggested in The Tribune last year, came up for discussion, but met with little favor, the general feeling being that council did not like changing an old established custom. The change proposed and adopted in many places is to hold the nomination from 7.30 to 8.30 in the evening, then follow on with the customary public meeting.
