BROUGHAM PRESBYTERIANS GIVEN A CHURCH

The Ontario Church Property Commission in decisions handed down on Friday last made the former Methodist church at Brougham, about eleven miles south-east of Stouffville, available for the minority of St. John's Presbyterian church in that village.

The hearing of the case of the minority of St. John's resulted in the former Methodist church, valued at \$1,500, becoming available for the non-concurring Presbyterians. In this case the church vote was very close, being 20 to 18. Upon agreement of the two factions, the following ruling was made: "The non-concurrences shall have the use of the Methodist church for a period of five years, to pay a nominal rental of \$1. per year, pay all insurance premiums and maintain repairs as in the past, provided, however, that if these terms are not lived up to, or if the minority does not show good faith within three months, their lease shall terminate."

BUS SERVICE NOW OPERATING

The novel way to travel now is by motor bus, and the newly inaugurated service between Stouffville and Toronto was established on Monday. Fine big comfortable cars are on the service, with splendid roomy seats such as are found in railway coaches. While the buses were not crowded on Monday, it was well patronized on Tuesday morning when about 25 passengers boarded it between Stouffville and the sixth concession.

The new service is to be known as the "Maple Leaf Bus Lines". Special places of call enroute to Toronto are Ringwood, Cashel, Unionville, Hagerman's, Agincourt, Ellesmere and Wexford. In the summer Musselman's Lake will be included in the route, and the service now connects with a car from Markham to Unionville. A pleasant waiting room is provided at the Toronto end at 598 Bay street or 2928 Danforth Ave. Arrangements are being made for waiting room accommodation in Stouffville.

A new revised schedule, has been decided on from that published in last week's Tribune, which will be enlarged on in the spring time.

Cars leave Stouffville daily excepting Saturday and Sunday at 8.30 a.m. and 3.00 p.m. Leave Toronto at 1.00 noon and 6.00 p.m. The Saturday schedule will be same as above with an extra car leaving Stouffville at 8.30 in the evening. Sunday car service: Leave Stouffville 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Leave Toronto 8.30 a.m. 1.30 noon and 9.30 p.m. For further information Toronto residents may phone Adelaide 6308 or Ran. 045w.

The fare from Stouffville to Toronto is \$1.60 return, from Markham \$1.00, and from Unionville \$1.00. The single fare from Stouffville is 85c. A book of tickets may be purchased which will entitle the holder to ten trips at the following rates from these points: Stouffville to Toronto \$7.50, Ringwood to Toronto \$7.00, Cashel to Toronto \$6.00, Unionville to Toronto \$4.00, and lesser amounts from nearer points.
