TRAGIC DEATH OF J.A.M. ARMSTRONG

J. A. M. Armstrong, ex-M.P. for North York died at his home in Lloydstown on Tuesday at 8.30 a.m. The death is a tragic ending for him to the court charges in which he was involved.

Mr. Armstrong is survived by his wife, two sons, and three daughters. His court case was to have been resumed today (Thursday).

He was given a hearing in court last Thursday, and had to spend the night in jail awaiting the arrangement of his bail. During this time he was so ill that he was taken into the hospital ward.

Unremitting efforts were made to secure the \$50,000 bail set by Magistrate T. H. Brunton.
