EDITORIAL COMMENT

Fundamentalists and modernists are still agreed on one thing—the collection plate.

If Mr. Coote brings down that measure in the House of Commons to reduce the tariff on automobiles by 20%, there will be a lot of rejoicing. Here's an instance where most people are agreed that lower tariff is in order.

The Alliston Herald wants the Ontario Church Property Commission disbanded because it has no powers beyond those of recommendation, and the business of adjusting property disputes arising out of church union referred to the municipal councils.

Premier King's majority in Prince Albert, Sask., is somewhere about 7000, there being some remote polls still to be reported. It is now possible that the Liberals will carry on the Government at Ottawa for some time. The chances of the opposition forcing an appeal to the electorate this coming summer are becoming more remote as the weeks go by. The premier's triumphant win in the western province will tend to strengthen the party in power, also other movements by the government are gradually increasing their chances of carrying on.

At the Ontario Association of Fairs held at Toronto, there was a demand made for the standardization of wearable parts in farm implements, the claim being made that it would be a great economic saving to farmers if mower and binder, cutter bars, plow points, wagon bolts, and other connectors, could be made of a uniform type. The same demand could also be made for electric fixtures. The householder is frequently perplexed and provoked on purchasing new plugs and fixtures to find that they will not connect with those on hand. The plea that standardization will destroy inventive genius is largely a subterfuge for the making of an increased number of sales owing to the inability of working old parts together. The modern manufacturing business seems to be a scheme as to how best to flim flam the public.

Hon. J. S. Martin has introduced into the Ontario Legislature his proposed Dairy Bill amendments, which will affect the farmers in this section of Ontario, where dairying is carried on to such an extent. The act will come into effect on proclamation. One section gives greater control over erection of factories making dairy products. Other sections have the new provisions to compel the grading of cream in the province. Actual grading is to be done by employees of the creameries, but under Government supervision. Pasteurization of all cream for butter-making is also to be made compulsory, after due notice. Provision is also made for the granting of first and second-class certificates to cheese-makers, and butter-makers, after adequate training.

PARLIAMENTARY SLOPPINESS

The following item from the Family Herald and Weekly Star of Montreal, a non-political journal, conveys a lot of common sense respecting present day government:

The outrageously large salaries, or subsidies, we pay members of the Federal Parliament are supposed to be given not for devotion to political parties, but for services done to the country. While Parliament is sitting its expenses are simply enormous, running up into scores of thousands a week.

Yet, with the country struggling to carry its ever increasing load of indebtedness, our paid Members of Parliament deliberately fritter away week after week on its important public questions awaiting settlement!

No single voice was raised in protest against the stupid waste of time, money and opportunity. It was even stated openly in the party newspapers, that whatever happened the session would be prolonged until the statutory period had been reached when the four thousand dollar salary should become payable!

The sloppy maneuvering, the shunting backwards of weary politicians eager to serve their own or their party's interests—any interests but those of their country they were elected and paid to serve—was disheartening to those who know the need of strong, reassuring government in Canada at the present moment.

If parties cannot agree to give strong support to one or another leader, why could they not unite in some way to give us an administration composed of the best men in the House, irrespective of parties.

Mrs. David Reesor of Cedar Grove who suffered a stroke, is recovering.

Mayor J. M. Walton of Aurora, is on a trip to his ranch in Alberta.

James Jones of Gormley has sold his farm east of Lake Wilcox to a Toronto broker.

Fred Gowland, ex-reeve of Markham village, has returned with his bride, from a honeymoon spent in Buffalo and other American centres.

The annual Interprovincial Plowing Match will be held this year at Niagara Falls, near Lundy's Lane. The Stouffville boys who take all the honors at these matches, will surely delight to perform on this historic spot.

James Nokes, for forty years proprietor of a livery stable in Uxbridge, passed away last week, in his 79th year. A model liveryman, and highly respected citizen, the passing of Mr. Nokes is mourned by many friends. He served in the army against the Real rebels in 1870 and also saw service in the Fenian raid.

The Markham Economist says: "The death occurred on Tuesday, Feb. 16th of Miss Nellie Farley of North Markham. Miss Farley was of a very quiet and sympathetic nature and much esteemed by her neighbors and friends of this village. The funeral was held on Thursday from the residence of Mr. Menno Raymer, interment at St. Andrew's cemetery, Markham."

York County Council made the following school grants last week: To High Schools—Weston \$53,523.29; Markham \$8,521.72; Richmond Hill \$21,847.13; Newmarket \$20,206.63; Aurora \$15,026.40; Scarborough \$18,026.40; Mimico, \$19,204.

To Continuation Schools—Stouffville \$2,266.28; Sutton \$2,096.94; Mount Albert \$1,474.22; Islinton \$1,710.90; Agincourt \$2,163.96; Schomberg \$635.59; Danforth Park S.S. No. 26 \$15,279.46; Long Branch \$3,322.23.

The new Narrows-bridge between the Counties of Ontario and Simcoe, is completed, with the exception of the swing, which is being erected by the Dominion Bridge Company of Montreal. By the terms of the contract it was to have been in place on January 15th, but the company asked for an extension of time till Mar. 15, which was granted. The structure is one of the finest in the province, and a credit to the two counties of Ontario and Simcoe. The entire cost of the structure is \$115,000, of which the Dominion Government contributed \$70,000, the Provincial Government \$35,000, and the Counties of Simcoe and Ontario \$17,500 each. The bridge is 500 feet in length with a bridge swing of 159 feet, and four arches, of seventy feet each, totalling 250 feet. The draw span is of steel and electrically operated, this latter feature adding \$10,000 to the original cost. The other spans, seven in number, are of reinforced truss type with four approach spans.
