Low Lake Levels Cause Huge Losses

Disastrous effects on lake commerce of low lake levels and heavy losses imposed on lake shipping interests from this condition are emphasized in the annual report of the Lake Carriers' Association, just issued.

The season of 1925 goes into lake history as marking a year of large tonnage movements, but with a revenue not commensurate with costs of operation, says the report in part. "As in other lines, a period of active business is depended on to recoup the losses of the dull periods. No great comfort in this respect is to be gleaned, however, from a retrospective view of the active freight movement of the season."

With no diminution in operating charges, but a reduction in cargo capacity, without increase in freight rates, gratifying results could not be obtained. The official returns show that vessels averaged 419 less tons of iron ore and 342 less tons of coal for cargo than in 1924, and sustained a loss correspondingly large in cargoes of grain. Further contributory to vessel expense were widespread delays due to shallow water at controlling points, as a direct result of low water levels.

As there has been a consistent recession in recommended loading draughts year after year, the economic loss to vessel owners by reason of declination from the 21 feet of five years ago to present draught of 18 feet 6 inches is so enormous that cost amounts to millions of tons of freight in a single season. The careful observer of this unremitting downward trend in water levels, with consequent reduction in vessel capacity, realizes

HOW WAS THE EARTH BORN?

Up to comparatively recent times it was believed that this solid globe of ours came from an enormous mass of gas which spun around so rapidly that it flung off rings, which in turn gave birth not only to our earth, but to all the other planets as well. The centre of this great volume of gas, it was supposed, eventually became the sun.

But this idea of the earth's origin has now been very largely discarded by scientists, and the latest theory is a singularly attractive one. According to it, we must first imagine a vast volume of gas in space, spinning round and producing arms or whorls with the rapidity of its motion, just as a rapidly spinning Catherine-wheel produces arms or whorls of sparks.

At various parts of these arms we must imagine there are patches much heavier and brighter than the rest of the gas in the arm, and that at very long intervals of time—millions of years, perhaps—these bright patches were thrown off the whirling arm and launched into space as stars. Each of these stars would become a sun.

Our sun was among them. It was, of course, without planets at that time. But it had lots of company in the form of other suns or stars which were still in the neighborhood, although they had been born so long before. It was, in fact, in quite a "crush" of suns, each of which had a certain influence on the others. That, to begin with, was how the latest theory accounts for the existence of the sun.

For ages our sun was not seriously affected by the presence of so many others, but a time came when one of these others approached quite close to it, and then the trouble began.

That a critical situation of momentous significance with regard to the future has arisen. The aspect is not at all chemical. The sand beaches now plainly visible at various points on all Great Lakes, and the appearance of shoals where once there were navigable depths of water, do not more graphically reveal the economic loss than has been sustained by lake commerce than does record of 1925 average iron-ore cargo.

Immortal Animals.

The chalk formers, the Globigerina, are among the most abundant protozoa in the sea. Nearly all surround themselves with a shell of soft calcium carbonate (chalk).

A pint of ocean water in the warmer climes may contain millions of them. The shells of the dead dropping to the bottom of the ocean have formed a thick layer of ooze over much of the ocean bed. The great chalk cliffs in England, and the chalk beds in Ireland, Denmark, Central Europe, North Africa, Syria, Central Asia, Texas, Kansas, and South Dakota are composed almost entirely of the shells of Globigerina that lived ten millions of years ago or more.

The small piece of chalk used by the carpenter is made of millions of the skeletons of these tiny protozoans. The protozoa were no doubt the first animals on earth, and inasmuch as two new animals are formed by the halving of the parent the tiny creatures may never die of old age, but so long as food and environment are favorable live millions of years.

They are therefore sometimes spoken of as the immortal animals. The protozoa are most numerous in stagnant water where as many as ten thousand can be present in a single drop. Ordinary drinking water, however, seldom contains more than a dozen in a quart, and good spring water often has none.

Glycerine will be found excellent for softening the water in which flannels are to be washed. About two teaspoonfuls to a quart of water will be sufficient.

Everyone knows how the moon raises tides in our oceans. Well, this passing sun raised tides on the surface of our sun. That effect was only natural because our sun in those days was composed of very much lighter gases than it is now.

These sun-tides were by no means on so tiny a scale as the moon-tides on the earth; they were tides which drew out from our sun's surface an enormous jet of gas, like a huge arm protruding from the sun.

On this jet, millions of miles long, there were portions which became more solid than the remainder and which eventually broke away. One of these was the earth. Other portions went to form the rest of the planets, such as Mercury, Venus, Jupiter and Mars.

That would seem to have been the only occasion on which our sun was seriously affected by another sun coming close to it. Such occasions must be very rare, because if they were frequent there would be an end to the stability of the universe.

As a fact, there is no sun nearer to ours at present than one called Proxima Centauri, which is twenty-four million million miles away (that is, twenty-four billion miles). At such a great distance its influence upon our sun, which is still gaseous, if of no account. In other words, its tidal effects on our sun are insignificant.

There are, however, suns still being born and still being subjected to the crowding which our sun experienced in its infancy. And we can still imagine some of these suns occasionally passing close to each other and tides being raised not only on one but on each of the two passing suns, and planets being born to them.

Wonders of Water Power.

Few people have any idea of the tremendous power of waves. When big waves hurl themselves against obstacles they exert enormous pressure. Builders of lighthouses, for instance, must take this into account. At the Eddystone lighthouse, the pressure during heavy storms has been estimated at nearly 1 1/2 tons a square foot!

Pressures even greater than this have been measured. Perhaps the highest is that recorded at Dunbar a few years ago. It was 3 3/4 tons a square foot. At the Bell Rock and Skerryvore lighthouses, wave pressures of 3 tons a square foot have been recorded.

No wonder the form of the coast-line is continually altering when it is subjected to such buffeting. We can now understand the difficulties engineers have to face in building sea-walls and breakwaters.

Huge boulders and blocks of stone are thrown about like shuttlecocks by the waves. In the island of Reunlon an immense mass of rock over 500 cubic yards in volume is to be seen far inland. It is really a huge boulder that the waves rolled there during a storm.

In the Bay of Biscay on one occasion a block of stone weighing 36 tons was lifted by the waves and thrown right over a breakwater. At Wick Bay it was found impossible to build a breakwater. A block of concrete weighing 1,000 tons was laid down and secured with bars of iron 8 in. wide and 3 in. thick. But the waves managed to dislodge it, snapping the iron bars like threads.
