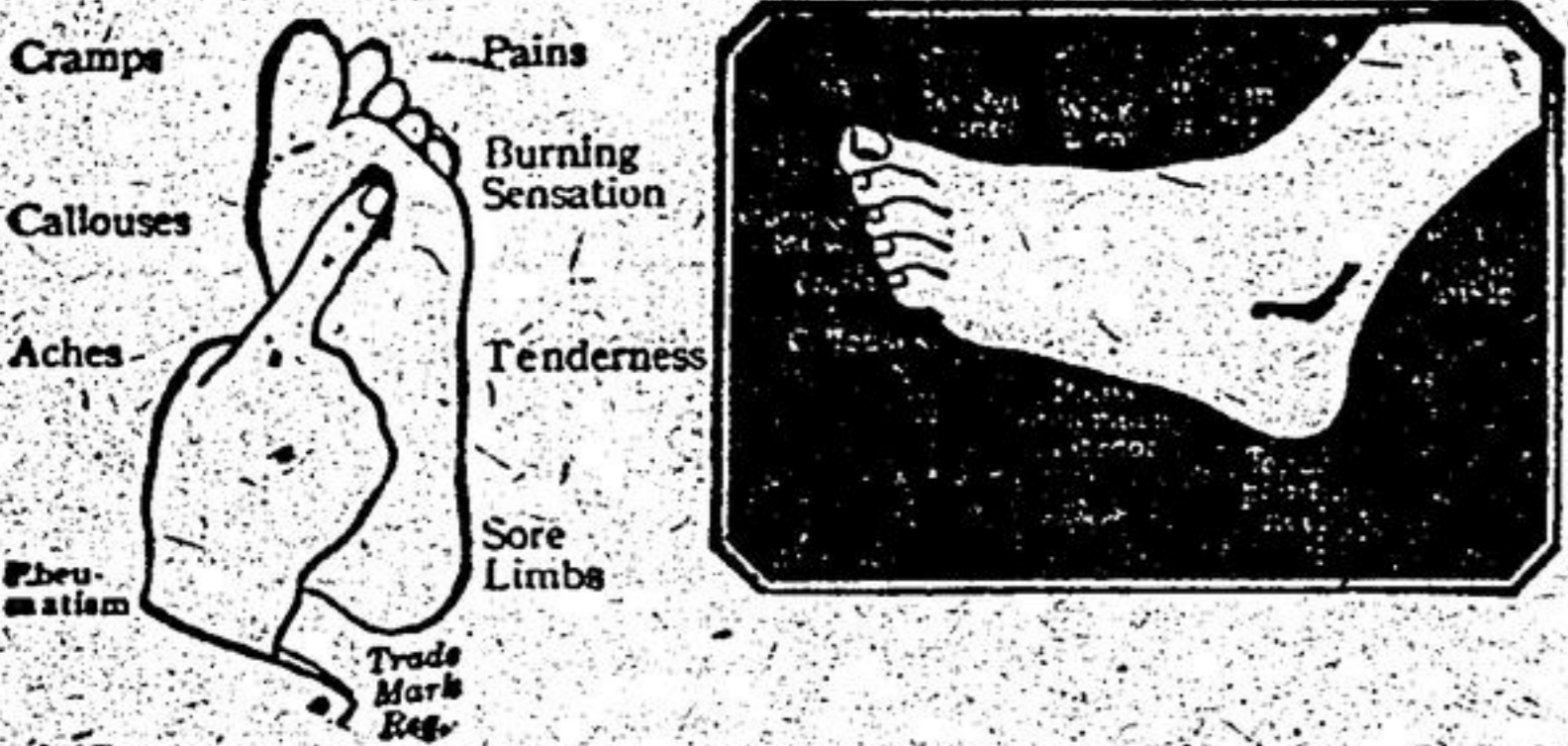

### EDITORIAL COMMENT

Britain is paying off its debt of four thousand eight hundred million dollars to the United States at the rate of \$500,000 a day, while the Allied nations owe Britain \$10,050,000,000—more than double Britain's debt to the United States—on which she has received very little as yet. No one can accuse Old John Bull of not "playing the game."

The children of today have a great advantage over the children of other days in the great variety of literature that is today produced for their entertainment, instruction and inspiration. So much that is good for the young to know in these days is presented in such an entertaining manner. The Public Library is well equipped in books and other publications for juvenile readers.

Some newspapers advocate the abolition of the automobile tariff entirely. This would be suicide to the industry. When Sir Robert Borden listened to the insistent demands of the western farmer and removed entirely the tax on tractors, the industry removed to the States, and today not a tractor is made in Canada. The government of today has done wisely in not removing entirely the whole tariff, which would destroy the industry.

The largest delegation that ever went before a government journeyed to Ottawa last week to interview Premier King and the Cabinet, protesting against the new tariff arrangement on automobiles. Approximately 1700 of the delegates were from Oshawa, the automobile city. The prime minister told the delegates that the tariff as now revised would come before parliament and unless amended by that body, would stand. Miss MacPhail also told the women's delegation that she approved of the present reduction to 20% and "although giving a straight forward opinion, in favor of the present tariff, she did say that the present arrangement of a higher duty on parts than on the finished car was inequitable, and should have further consideration." Figures were given out showing that of the 84000 cars built and sold in Canada last year they carried an average tax of \$207.14 which went direct to the government, and this is the reason for the increased price over American prices according to the manufacturers themselves. If this is a fact most people will agree that it is time for a tax reduction on cars—and a still greater reduction on car parts.

There is an effort being made to remit the fine imposed on Amelius Jarvis of \$200,000 for defrauding this province and for which he served six months at the jail farm. A petition signed by many financial men of all political complexions, has gone to Ottawa, as intercessory for him. A petition of this sort doesn't mean much, for Jarvis is a man of wealth, and many of the petitioners were men in the wealthy class and others, no doubt, who are mostly members of the Toronto Hunt Club. Peter Smith is paying the penalty for his part in the case, although he cannot pay over the money assessed on him by the judge because he is not worth it. The fact that the general public are of the opinion that others escaped punishment when Smith and Jarvis were sentenced is no excuse for allowing Mr. Jarvis to "pull" the Dominion Government for a rebate of his fine. So far Ottawa has not jumped at the suggestion that they should rebate this money. Hon. W. F. Meikle, finance minister in the Ontario Government says in connection with this matter: "In our opinion the matter is not one now within the executive control of the Federal authorities, the fine having been paid and belonging either to the province, as the province contends, or to the city, if the city legal department is correct in the interpretation of the law. A fiat was granted some time ago to the city that a decision might be had, and the case is now before the courts."

### WILL COMMENCE REFORESTATION THIS SPRING

The Reforestation Committee of the Ontario County Council have practically concluded the settlements and transfers of deeds to the properties purchased in Uxbridge Twp. for the County of Ontario Reforestation work in the County. Very shortly everything will be ready for the Provincial Forestry Department to go ahead with the plans entered into with the County and it is intended to have a portion of the land planted this spring. The committee have secured the services of John D. Hill, of Manilla, as overseer. Mr. Hill is a well known Brock boy who served overseas with the 116th Batt. Chairman, Reeve Philip of Brock and his committee are to be congratulated upon the success that is attending their efforts to further the Reforestation work in the County.

### MARKHAM'S HYDRO SURPLUS

In the annual report submitted by the Hydro-Electric Power and Light Commission of Ontario to the municipal council of the village of Markham, while the increase in the number of consumers is not set out, the statement is by all means the most gratifying in the history of the town, says a report from Markham. After deducting all operating expenses and allowing a handsome margin for depreciation, there is a net surplus on the year's business of \$1,263.75. On all hands the statement is hailed with satisfaction, especially in view of the fact that substantial reductions have been made in the cost of power and light to the consumers since the coming of hydro.
