EDITORIAL COMMENT

Speculation is growing strong as to the likelihood of their being a Provincial election in this province in June. The date is hinted as being the 25th, but Premier Ferguson has handed out no information so far, nor has he denied the rumors afloat. One thing that points strongly to an early contest is the fact that some cities have been ordered to prepare part III of the voters list and have it printed, and this is only used in case of provincial contests. So far such instructions have not been issued to the clerk of Stouffville, Whitechurch or Markham.

On every hand is expressed great dissatisfaction about the condition of the roads near Stouffville on the Toronto and York Highway, and through the town. There is no question but that the road would be in better condition if the local council had charge of the repairs, as at the present time there is no one with whom an appeal can be lodged against the deplorable conditions that exist in places. Beyond the appointment of a road superintendent with instructions to do as little repair work as possible, no thought whatever is given to the roads in this northern part of York. It's a pity that the corporation could not again secure control of the road through town, and maintain it with a small grant from the Commission, and a limited use of its heavy machinery when necessary.

Here's some common sense talk from the Beaverton Express: "Bus service between Orillia and Toronto on the Provincial Highway is to commence for the season next week. One would think Orillia had close enough connection with Toronto with two lines of railway (both National) and many trains daily to accommodate its people. The National railways surely give service enough without taking over our roads for which so high a price has been paid in construction to their competitors. When the cost of roadbeds and maintenance for these "Bus Lines" are borne by the public there is small reason why they may not cut the fare and undersell the railways which are owned by the people. There's surely something wrong in this."

Richmond Hill's population has been increased considerably the last few days by reason of the influx of Bell Telephone workmen, who will be engaged for the greater part of this month in repairing the damage caused to the lines on Bathurst st. Vaughan, by the storm of a few weeks ago. Some 50 men are engaged between Willowvale and Oak Ridges. Spans are being shortened from 130 to 90 feet, and about 500 new poles will be put up. A digging and pole-raising machine is being operated which makes it possible to dig a hole in 2 1/2 minutes and complete the erection of a pole in less than 10 minutes.

James Meek of Sandford, a prominent Scott Township farmer, is dead, aged 47 years.

Markham Village is observing a Wednesday half holiday until the end of September.

Last week was clean up week in Aurora, our neighboring town to the west. The week was ushered in by a monster parade headed by the band. The attractive town today is necessarily a clean town.

Hon. Duncan Marshall recently called to the Senate of Canada delivered addresses in the United Church at Kettleby on Mother's Day, May 9th, at 2:30 and 7:30. Senator Marshall is one of the most pleasing and appealing orators in Canada and the rare treat of having him attracted large audiences.

Daylight saving in Aurora was rejected Saturday when the residents voted against it by a majority of 22 votes. Every person on the assessment rolls was given the opportunity to vote. Mayor J.M.
