UXBRIDGE TP. COUNCIL

Met at Goodwood, Saturday, May 22nd, members all present.

Minutes were passed of regular meeting also minutes of special meeting of May 12th, called for the purpose of passing a bylaw for the purchase of ten acres of the east half lot 26, con. 3, for reforestation purposes.

The following communications were read:

From A. M. St. John, reeve of Uxbridge town, re estimate of our expenditure on west boundary of town for 1926.

From H. S. Pugh, Glen Major, an account for damage to his fall wheat through getting gravel.

From A. M. Gibson, Dist. Supt. Postal Service, advising that before any change in rural No. 1, could be made they would require a duly signed petition by the interested patrons.

From M. H. Crosby, clerk of Uxbridge town, cheque for \$26.69, being amount due this Tp. for work performed on west boundary of town in 1925.

From R. C. Muir, Chief Engineer of Municipal Roads, summary of expenditure on our roads for 1926 and amount of subsidy to be received by this Township being \$2,517.99. Same has been received by treasurer.

From Toronto General Hospital, stating that unless account of \$40.50 for care of Hazel Leitch was settled within ten days legal proceedings would be taken for its recovery, and also again rendering account of \$37.50 for care of Wm. Edwick.

Fred Middleton, interviewed the Council re securing Hydro for the Village of Goodwood, stating that he thought there was a sufficient number to take Hydro to bring it to Goodwood from Stouffville, three farmers per mile or equivalent being required. All hydro contracts have to be made through the Council of the interested municipality, and a bylaw for that purpose was passed by the Council in May 1925, whereby ratepayers of the Township might secure Hydro for lighting.

On motion of Messrs. Todd and Glaspell, a resolution was passed instructing the clerk to write Mr. F. A. Gaby, chief Hydro Engineer, requesting that an official be sent to explain the method of rendering service to rural communities, when the date is secured a public meeting may be called.
