DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Four car loads of equipment arrived in Brooklyn last week for the work of paving the highway through there.

In future tourists and others visiting the town park at Whitby on Sunday will be forbidden from playing games there on that day.

Whitby Town Council are dealing with the dust nuisance on side streets which is described in the Gazette & Chronicle as a menace to householders. It is proposed to lay the dust with calcium chloride the cost to be met as under the local improvement bylaw.

Just to prove that the matter of food is largely a state of mind Geo. Hasler Johnston, will start from Chicago for New York at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning. He proposes to walk the thousand miles without a mouthful of food, subsisting entirely upon water. He says he eats his last meal at 7 o'clock this evening, and will not dine again until June 30, when he expects to be in New York. Johnston is 29 years old and a gymnastic director. Johnston must take 2,112,000 steps according to his plan, before he takes up the knife, fork and spoon.

In appreciation of the care and attention given to his daughter, the late Hama Kobayashi, who, while a student of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, was taken ill and passed away in Oshawa Hospital, Mr. Tomijiro Kobayashi, a prominent Japanese manufacturer and citizen of Tokio, the Japanese capital, has forwarded to the college principal, Rev. F. L. Farewell, a cheque for two thousand yen, which is equivalent to \$937.50 in Canadian currency, with the direction that the money be used as the Board of Directors see fit. A scholarship will be established to honor the memory of the dead student.
