R. J. Rogers, Agricultural representative was granted the sum of \$25 for Township school fairs.

J. A. Mabley, was appointed special summer constable for Lake, Wilcox district, and Raulph Connor, same for Musselman's Lake district.

Council granted Rae Reid the privilege of erecting a tent or booth on the unused part of the 2nd con. line at north side of Wilcox Lake under direction of Deputy Reeve Leary, commissioner, at rental of \$20 for the summer.

Council set the payments price for small tractors operating small graders at \$1.20 per hour and for large tractor on large grader at \$1.50 per hour.

The Treasurer was instructed to pay J. A. Clarke, assessor, \$250.00 salary and postage for year 1926.

Re-voting, grant of \$75.00 to Cemetery Board of Managers, Hartman cemetery for construction of covered drain in front of same, on condition that Township of East Gwillimbury give a like amount, on further condition that Cemetery Board be responsible for any damages occasioned to the Township.

COURT OF REVISION
At 2 o'clock Council was constituted as Court of Revision, Reeve Baker appointed chairman, and the Clerk, Secretary.

The several appeals were presented and decided as follows:

Assessment, W. A. McAdam, on building of summer cottage was reduced to \$150.

Assessment, Basil Fierheller on farm land was reduced \$400.

Assessment of dogs to Frank Playter, Isaac Scott, Chas. Greenwood and L. E. Ewart was ordered removed from the roll. Dogs being disposed of.

The assessment of May Boyle was reduced from \$1000 for 41 1/2 acres to \$800 for 23 3-10 acres, because of error in assessment.

Appeal of E. T. Stephens, limited, for reduction of assessment was disallowed.

On motion Court adjourned sine die. After Court of Revision, council resumed its session and adjourned to July 10 next, at 10 o'clock.


