## 190 APPLICANTS TO TEACH 3RD BOOK

Miss Orchard of Port Perry chosen

It would be impossible for us to tabulate the large list of applications received by Stouffville School Board, for a third book teacher. No less than 190 applied. There were English, Irish, Scotch, Canadian, French and a few doubtful nationalities. Men, women and girls married, single, and some in the intervening stage.

When the Board faced the problem of reading 190 letters and their accompanying recommendations, they realized a lengthy session was before them on Wednesday evening of last week.

The successful applicant is Miss Norma Orchard of Port Perry, a young lady with seven years' successful teaching experience, holding a first-class certificate.

After the general board had selected three most promising applicants, the final choice was left in the hands of the Management committee, Rev. C. E. MacLeod, W. H. Shaw and A. V. Nolan, who were instructed to secure Miss Orchard after having a personal interview with her, as had been done in the other two cases.

One hundred and ninety answers to an advertisement which called for only an experienced teacher, emphasizes how greatly the teaching profession is over crowded in this province at the present time.
