Mr. Banks from Toronto, is building a new house on his ten acre lot. Mr. Banks intends to raise poultry. We'd sooner write about new houses being erected than about fires that destroy them as has so frequently occurred of late years.

The road from the Gwillimbury townline to Ballantrae is now ready for traffic. There is yet about half mile to be built south of Ballantrae which will complete the roadbuilding here for this season.

Many Toronto people like to come out here on Sundays and holidays and picnic along the country road, and to this no one objects. However, it is remarkable how many of those city folks there are that can see no danger in fire. Hollidge, foreman of the reforestation, with his help had to fight the fire for days and nights so as to prevent it from running over the newly planted area of young forest trees. We sincerely hope that our council will use their prerogatives and speedily stop once for all time the work of the careless and indifferent.
