Stouffville public and Continuation schools will reopen on Sept. 7th. Every pupil is requested to be on hand the opening day. In the more rural sections many of the schools opened yesterday. (Wednesday.)

Among the fans at the Stouffville-Sutton game in Aurora last week we noticed J. W. Thompson and his wife, (nee Laura O'Brien) now of Newmarket, loudly and lustily cheering for the old home town team. Another proof of the claim, "once a Stouffvilleite, always a Stouffvilleite."

Mr. Ralph Flint has returned to Toronto, where he will resume building operations in the east end of the city, after having completed two good houses in town, namely Edw. Pennock's and the Mennonite parsonage. The parsonage property is being occupied by Rev. A.G. and Mrs. Warder and family, who will enjoy this fine new home.

This issue of the Tribune may be termed, "a surprise edition" owing to the announcement we made last week that there would be no issue on Sept. 2nd, due to it being our annual holiday week. However, owing to much special advertising matter due to the election and because of a necessary legal advertisement in this issue which requires to be published this week, part of the staff is retained to get out this paper.

The more settled condition of the weather which cleared up on Saturday, has been the salvation of the crops in this district. As it is, much of the grain is spoiled, and there will be some fields where the hail struck north of town a few weeks ago that will be unfit for harvest. This is the best harvest week so far and farmers are cutting and hustling in the grain with a double shuffle.

On Saturday Mr. Harvey Lawson completed a deal for the sale of their fine home on Church St. in exchange for Toronto property. This means that the Lawson family are shortly to leave Stouffville for the city which is a matter of general regret. We are loath to part with good citizens, and the Lawsons are among the best. The fine Lawson home on Church St. was built in 1893 by Mrs. Lawson's father, the late Sam'l Burkholder, and is among the finest homes in town, and one of the largest.

This Thursday evening Hon. Duncan Marshall will speak in Raticoff's Hall, Stouffville, in the interest of Harry Stifton, the Liberal candidate for North York. Mr. Marshall is a native of the Township of Elderslie, Bruce County, and when a young man, located at Olds, Alta.; finally entering the Liberal Government in that province, and rising to the position of Minister of Agriculture. Since that time he has held several good appointments, recently having been Liberal organizer. At to-night's meeting the candidate will also speak.

The town of Aurora has received a lot of free advertising and attracted over 1500 people to its confines to spend a half day, by reason of according the use of their athletic grounds to Stouffville for two semi-final baseball games which were to be played on neutral grounds. The athletic grounds at Uxbridge were first decided on for the game with Sutton, but officials in Uxbridge asked a rental for the grounds which promptly quered the proposition. Funny, some town will maintain a free motor camp for tourist strangers, but a neighbor is asked to pay for similar privilege which would in the long run bring more grist to the town mill.

The Stouffville voters' lists posted up for inspection, and which will be used in the coming election, contain the names of 752 persons entitled to vote. Of course, this list is subject to revision between now and six o'clock on Saturday evening.

At the Canadian National Exhibition on Monday, Mr. A. J. Ward of the Brierbush won third prize in the gladiolus competition. The competition was for the best six blooms, singles, and there were 30 entries in the class. As a grower of "glads" the Brierbush is fast making a name for itself by coming to the front in Canada's National show in this way.

The sad and untimely death took place last Friday in the Toronto General Hospital of Hannah Ogden, wife of Gordon Ferrier of Stouffville. Two weeks ago Mrs. Ferrier entered the hospital suffering from some internal trouble not located on Wednesday prior to her death. Mr. Ferrier conversed freely with her, when she seemed quite bright and gave instructions concerning the home in her absence. The following day her condition changed, and she rapidly failed until the end came at noon on Friday. The funeral took place to Bethel cemetery, south Markham, on Tuesday. The late Mrs. Ferrier was born in England, coming to Canada when a young girl with her family, and located near Unionville. Eight years ago last January she united in marriage with Mr. Ferrier, and three years later they located in Stouffville. Besides the husband two step-children also survive, Mary, aged 16, at home, and Mr. Ferrier's only son living north of town. Two brothers also survive her, Joseph of Island Lake and Emiah Ogden of Unionville. Mrs. Ferrier united with the Christian church 50 years ago.

Sports, Scottish dancing and musical selections featured the third annual reunion of the Clan Forsythie, which was held on Saturday in the Memorial Park, Clarendon. About 300 members of the Clan were present, including a number from the sister society in the United States. Piper Jack Robinson from Toronto provided the music for the exhibition dances, and a number of speakers addressed the meeting and outlined plans for the coming year. The election of the Clan chieftain by the members resulted in the re-appointment of G. Malcolm Forsythe for the coming year. A memorial service for twelve of the Clan who have passed away since the last reunion of a year ago was conducted by Dr. J.E. Forfar of Toronto. The principal address was given by P. B. Forsythe, of Washington, D.C., who dealt with the history of the Clan in Canada, and a number of other speakers addressed the meeting.

The gathering is the result of an effort to link together all Forsythes and to form a branch of the Clan Forsythie which already exists in Scotland and was called by G. M. Forsythie two years ago at his home Clarendon, with some 200 members in attendance. Last year a second reunion was held and an association formed and plans are now under way for its affiliation with a similar society in the United States, and with the Clan in Scotland. It is also proposed to continue research into the history of the Clan, which has already been traced back to 1335. The formation of the Canadian branch has aroused widespread interest, and letters not only from the United States, but even from Australia, have been received in this connection.
