### EDITORIAL COMMENT

Good roads may not make a town, but they have a whole lot to do with the impression the town makes on visitors.

Richmond Hill W.C.T.U. at a meeting last week pledged themselves to vote for "dry candidates" at the coming provincial election, irrespective of party affiliations.

Hon. Hugh Guthrie, a Liberal representing one of the Wellingtons for 20 years, is chosen temporary leader of the Conservative party at Ottawa. Mr. Guthrie left the Liberals in war days turning Unionist, and later Conservative.

Closed season on partridge. Let us all respect the law in this year of 1926. These birds will multiply rapidly if not molested for a year or two. The game commissioner is to be praised or his decision in this matter.

For every hardware store in the country there is on the average a population of 2,900 people. For every grocery there are 352 people; butcher shop 300; drug store 1,400; clothing store, 2,300; furniture store 3,200 and shoe store 4,800.

Whether the Canadian National Railways take it out of the people of Canada by having the government pay their annual deficit, or by exacting such enormous freight rates as to overcome the shortage, is not materially different. It all comes out of the people in the final analysis. What is really wanted is analysis. What would count more for the people would be to reduce the high salaries of officials.

From information gleaned at a meeting of Progressives in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, last Friday, a big effort will be made to defeat the Ferguson Government at the next election. Hon. W. E. Raney presided and a resolution was passed endorsing his leadership. Rev. Ben. Spence, A. W. Roebuck and Arthur Hawkes were closeted at the gathering for some time and plans for the next election campaign were discussed. Hon. F. C. Biggs intimated that the next provincial election would be fought on the temperance issue.

Uxbridge and district has a ministerial association which is a real live organization. All the ministers in the town and a certain radius in the country are eligible, and they boast a membership of eleven. Such an organization can perform very useful work, and prevent much overlapping in the christian field under their direct control. Because there are so many ministers in Stouffville and the immediate district this paper has on previous occasion advocated a ministerial association which could function to good advantage here. Denominational prejudices and overlapping of the work would be eliminated, and a more friendly spirit instilled in the minds of men, through co-operation, one with the other.

When an Essex farmer complained that the pheasants were eating his corn, the game department killed two of the birds, examined their crops and found 200 cutworms—and no corn. Almost without exception, when the scientists investigate such cases they find the same results. The farmer owes his crop to the feathered police that keep down the bugs, insects and worms. When continuing slaughter of every form of bird life, the insect loss will be heavier and farm work harder. The nation could train an army of riflemen in a comparatively short time, but it couldn't in a century restore the bird armies that are the farmer's allies in raising food to feed the country.

The bitterness of the late election campaign is having its aftermath in the issuance of writs for damages to make good alleged injuries to reputations. For some time there have been rumours afloat regarding the outcome of a story which was circulating in the Dufferin-Simcoe constituency and which Earl Rowe, M.P.P., thought of sufficient importance to give it some attention on the platform at his meeting in Shelburne. Tuesday the writ was issued against Wm. McKelvie of Mono Township. The amount named therein is \$20,000, and the alleged offence charged is circulating a story which charged Mr. Rowe with cattle stealing. Mr. W. A. Boys has issued a writ for damages against the Toronto Star, and there are persistent rumors that another one will be issued before the election bitterness is dissipated. Alliston Herald.

## ONTARIO DENTAL HEALTH DAY

Free Clinics at Stouffville

The Ontario Department of Health realizing that dentistry is an important factor in the great public health movement, has set apart Wednesday Oct. 20th as Dental Health Day.

Co-operating with the Ont. Dept. of Health, is the Ont. Medical and the Ont. Dental Associations, the registered Nurses, the Ont. Educational Council, the Ont. Hygiene Council, Women's Institutes, Service Clubs, the public press, and a number of other organizations.

If people are suffering and dying because of dental infection through decayed teeth, ulceration and pyorrhea (this being proved to be the cause of many of the diseases of the body), the Health Department feel that it is high time to do something to prevent and remove the causes.

We all know that the mouth is the gateway to the body, that everything we eat and drink, and even the air we breathe, must pass through this gateway, then how imperative it is to keep the mouth in a healthy condition in order to prevent infection.

Dr. Mayo of Rochester, says, that 75% of diseases originate from unhealthy conditions in the mouth. The medical profession are unanimous in its opinion that many of the diseases of the body can be traced directly to a diseased and unsanitary mouth.

The noted Dr. Osler says that "Decay of the teeth is the most urgent and gravest of all diseases of our time; a more serious national scourge than cancer or consumption and is the main cause of infection and diseases in general".

Good health and good sense are two of life's greatest blessings. The public health is the foundation upon which repose the happiness of the people; and the strength of the nation, therefore, the care of the public health is the first duty of all Boards of Health and all others who have the welfare of the nation at heart.

Bacteria or germs are always present in the mouth, but when the teeth have been neglected and show large cavities the number of bacteria is largely increased.

Dr. Price, the noted authority on

germ diseases, states that, while the normal mouth may show a count of ten million, a mouth with extensive decay will give a count of 500 million germs.

All dental offices throughout Ontario will be thrown open for free examination, consultation and advice, and following in the train of the rest of the province Drs. Smith and Barker will have their offices open for free examination and advice, and will be glad to have as large a number as possible call on Wednesday next, Oct. 20th, the Ont. Dental Health Day.
