## DIED AT GORMLEY

Mrs. Tillman Hoover of this town  
has been twice bereaved within a  
very short period. Only in June  
last her sister died, and on Friday,  
October 15th, her father, John W.  
Empringham, passed away at his  
late home in Gormley, following a
