EDITORIAL COMMENT

Grits will be voting Tory and Tories will be voting Grit in the coming election, we are told. In which case we may expect a lot of high-bounded old Tory and Grit fathers rising up in their graves at such disloyalty.

The Watford Guide says: A farmer who moved to the city a year ago paid \$80 more for the use of a modest dwelling than his farm yielded him in rental for the year. The farm is well located, has a good house and barn, up-to-date hen-house and a double garage. There is something wrong somewhere when a place to eat and sleep in town is worth more than an improved farm.

The people of Ontario were never given a clearer issue to vote on than that which they will be called upon to cast their ballot on Dec. 1st. If you want beer shops in places where there is not a local option bylaw in force, and a different system of selling whiskey, known as government control, then vote for Ferguson, or if you prefer the present O.T.A. law under which the bootlegger is thriving, then support Sinclair, leader of the Liberal party. There is no denying the fact that the O.T.A., with all its weaknesses, has improved the temperance situation in the rural sections of Ontario.

Mr. Herman Eldridge, Dayton, Ohio, will give an address at 11:20. There will be a full program in the afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock. Mr. Eldridge will speak again at 4:15. The evening service will be Thanksgiving, beginning at 7:30.

Here and There

Edmonton—Large mouthed black bass may soon be available to Alberta sportsmen for a batch of fingerlings and yearlings from the Kootenay Lakes have been placed in Lac La Nonne by the Northern Alberta Fish and Game Protective Association.

McGill University opened her senior football season in Montreal at the Percival Molson Memorial Stadium on October 2nd, with a game against the Old Boys. One of the most enthusiastic fans of this game is E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who is an annual ticket holder, and who will be present at all the big games this season.

In a recent despatch from the west, W. L. Smith, former editor of the Farmer's Sun, estimates that approximately \$1,000,000,000 will be added to Canada's income this year from the products of the farms of Western Canada. Last year's field crops were valued at \$1,112,691,000 to the growers and it put the west in the prosperity column. Mr. Smith believes it is a fair assumption that this year the return will not be less.

An interesting estimate of Canada's per capita wealth has been made by the League of Nations, with comparative figures of 22 years ago. In 1925 the per capita wealth in this country amounted to \$2,406, as contrasted with \$1,100 per capita in 1903. Out of the 35 nations listed, Canada ranks third, the United States showing \$2,918 and Great Britain \$2,459 per capita, respec-
