UXBRIDGE TOWNSHIP ADDS 88 NAMES

At the Court of Revision of the voters' list for the Township of Uxbridge, held on Thursday, the 11th day of Nov. in preparation of the forthcoming Provincial election, held before His Honor Judge Ruddy as revising officer, there were 105 appeals, 10 of same were already on the list, 5 were disallowed, and 4 were duplicates, (both sides apparently wanting them). There was 88 names added to the voters' list of the township.

TORIES RE-NOMINATE HON. GEO. S. HENRY

Hon. George S. Henry, Minister of Public Works and Highways, was unanimously re-nominated for the Legislature on Saturday afternoon last when the East York Conservative Association held its convention in the R. H. McGregor school, East York. More than 400 citizens were in attendance, and no other name was offered to the chair.

In his address of acceptance, Hon. Mr. Henry dealt more with the Ferguson government's record in office than with the government liquor sale issue. The Conservative Administration, he said, had reduced the deficit from \$15,000,000, when the present Government went into power, to about \$1,500,000 now. Nor had this been accomplished, he argued, by allowing work to go undone. Development of the Province's natural resources had been pushed unceasingly, yet sanely, and in such a manner as to give benefit to the people of Ontario, not outsiders the greater benefit.

As to the liquor issue, the speaker claimed that Government sale would eliminate the bootlegger. Mentioning the jettisoning of the beer-parlor proposal, he confided that, in so doing, Premier Ferguson had outwitted the prohibitionists, who were planning a campaign of "Abolish the Bar and Save the Boy."

The rainbow seen in the sky early last Monday morning may be seized upon by the "drys" as carrying the same assurance it gave to the people in the days of Noah, when it was given as a sign that they should not again be flooded out.

DISTRICT & GENERAL Among The Churches

A radio broadcasting station has been established at Bracebridge.

Charles Hodgins of East Gwillimbury paid \$5.00 and cost for permitting his son, a minor, to drive his automobile.

The village of Cookstown with 500 or less people, boasts of nine gasoline pumps on its main street. Stouffville with over double this population, is well supplied with six such pumping stations.

A six year-old boy of Shanty Bay, Dalton Partridge, was kicked by a horse on Saturday and died in Barrie hospital the same day. The lad was running behind the horses in the stable when he was kicked in the head.

At a meeting of the Directors of the Canadian National Exhibition held one day last week it was decided to hold the 60th anniversary next year. The question of extending the Exhibition to three weeks, which is favored by many, has been deferred, as considerable opposition is offered by a number of exhibitors.

Rev. J. L. McCullough of Toronto who has taken the services during the last year, in Markham, has been appointed to take charge of the Presbyterian church, until next spring. The new church is rapidly approaching completion and the opening date will be announced very shortly.

Constable E. Cookman of Peterboro, a war veteran, reported to the Crown attorney at Whitby last week as provincial constable, to succeed P.C. H. O. Taylor, recently removed to Windsor. Constable Cookman had a good record overseas and also in Peterboro. He spent 15 months in Christie Street Hospital after coming home and recently he has been doing detective work on the Canadian-American border.

The price of wood has kept pace with the price of coal and the owner of a good bush is a fortunate person. On Saturday Miss Nellie Lapp offered 10 acres of standing timber on lot 6, con. 5, Scarborough, by auction. Auctioneer Prentice sold the timber in quarter acre lots. The whole ten acres brought \$1282. One quarter acre brought \$76 and four of the best quarter acre lots aggregated \$266.

So far there are two criminal cases to be heard at the Supreme Court sittings opening at Whitby on Nov. 22nd. Former City Relief Officer Brown, of Oshawa, awaits trial on an alleged serious offence, while a young man named Whitfield committed for trial in connection with a recent holdup and robbery at Port Perry, also comes up. Thos. Slee, sentenced over a year ago for arson, still awaits a new trial granted him by the Appellate Court.

A most dangerous practice indulged in by many boys, who wish to demonstrate their skill, is that of riding bicycles with their hands off the handle-bars. A few days ago a sad accident occurred in Oshawa in which a boy was instantly killed by a motor truck. The evidence at the inquest showed that the unfortunate lad, who was a bright student and held in high esteem by all who knew him, had his hands by his side when he was riding his bicycle, and rode directly in front of the truck with such sad results. It is all very well for a boy to try these stunts in places where there is no likelihood of him coming in contact with a motor vehicle, but the highway is no place for him to try it.

That there are deer within the confines of Ontario County was revealed recently when Wm. Maw, auctioneer, of Whitby, sighted two of the fleet footed species while driving along the 6th concession west of Brooklin. Monday morning a deer about half grown was not only seen but caught in a creek running through "Devil's Den" a few miles west of Brooklin. Mr. A. Walmsley, of Oshawa, and son Harold, were out motoring through the district and met Jas. Duff and the Cooper Brothers of Brooklin, who were out hunting. They had seen the deer and were endeavoring to corner it. It, however, remained for the little Scotch terrier "Henry" owned by Mr. Duff, to chase it into the creek where it could not get away. The deer, while apparently quite smart, had been the victim of attacks by dogs, and partly decomposed. It was carried into Brooklin and turned over to the police who destroyed it.


