### OLD BOY WRITES FROM REGINA

A familiar figure in Stouffville twenty years ago was Mr. Chester C. Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Graham of Stouffville, but like many of the young men of that time, he struck out to make his mark in the world. That he has made a marked success in business speaks for itself, for Mr. Graham is now Secretary-Treasurer of the Western Manufacturing Co. This interesting letter will be read by hundreds of Stouffville old boys with interest.

Regina, Sask., Nov. 17, 1926  
The Tribune, Stouffville, Ont.

Dear Mr. Nolan:  
In looking over the label on the Tribune I find it is time I was mailing you a remittance to cover my subscription for another year and therefore have pleasure in enclosing a renewal for 1927.

I must say, I look forward each week to receiving the Tribune as it is just like receiving a weekly letter from the old home in Stouffville. It is now nearly seven years since I visited your town. I believe the time to give bouquets is while people are living and I wish to say that since the Irishman assumed control of the Stouffville Tribune it has been a live periodical, full of pep and worth while reading.

When I wrote you a year ago I mentioned that prosperity was returning to the West and the good times have been getting much better as time progresses. For the past two years the agriculturists have been realizing good returns on their products and as this is an agricultural country you will readily understand that when the farmers are prosperous the merchants and manufacturers are prosperous to an equal degree. The Western Manufacturing Company Ltd., with which I am identified, is sharing in the good times. We are operating ten hours each day and over time three nights each week. We are employing over one hundred men this year and at the present moment have un-filled orders enough to keep us busy until the spring of 1927. We anticipate a very busy season next year.

We sell our commodities in the province of Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan, doing business principally through the lumber companies throughout these provinces. The building permits in Regina this year have exceeded four million dollars. We have supplied factory work on the Sacred Heart Academy, Nurses Home, Broder's Hotel, costing two hundred thousand dollars, and have the contract to supply the millwork for the new Canadian Pacific Hotel and Grace Church. The Canadian Pacific Hotel will cost about one-half million dollars. We have seven Masonic lodges here and the members have put up a new Masonic Temple costing between \$65,000 and \$75,000 and as several of our organization are members of that mystic body we were awarded the contract for the factory work.

I am enclosing a picture of the Canadian Pacific Hotel and as I know you will be interested in the new Masonic Temple I will mail you a picture of it later on.

In addition to the several large buildings there has been erected in Regina this year about five hundred residences.

In the way of a little recreation this summer Mrs. Graham, Marjorie Graham and myself took a motor trip, taking in the stampede at Calgary, Alta., Banff, Lake Louise, and down the Windermere Trail to Cranbrook, B.C., crossing over the line to Kalispel, Montana, shipping our car over the American Rockies to Glazier Park, Montana and returning via Cardston, Alta. We had a wonderful trip through the Canadian Rockies and experienced the novelty of going through a forest fire on the Windermere Trail. We were one hour ahead of a car with six people, four of whom were burned to death. That was a very close call. Time and space prevent me from going into minute details of our trip. A person cannot anticipate the beauty of the mountains without seeing them, and after driving over the mountain roads I feel I am fully qualified to drive a car. Our only mishap was one tire puncture and we had it so arranged that it happened in front of a garage in Fort Steele, B.C.

I hope some time to again pay your town a visit. With best regards to all my old friends in Stouffville and vicinity and wishing you and yours a merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year.

Hume, interviewed the members of the Hydro-Electric Commission in Toronto on Wednesday. The matter of local rates were discussed and the feeling of this municipality was presented by Chairman Greene of the local electric light committee and other members. It is confidently expected that a reduction will be made in the commercial rates from 4½c. per kilowatt hour to 3½c. for the first hundred hours and from 2c. for the balance to 1½c. Other questions affecting local hydro users were discussed and it is hoped that everything will soon be adjusted to the satisfaction of all."
