### MARKHAM TP. COUNCIL

Township council met pursuant to statute on Dec. 15th, with all the members present and Reeve Gohn in the chair.

Communications received from:— Fred Pike, re gravel, trees and fence; Dr. Hore, re bill for attending Geo. Vanzant; Dr. C. R. McKay, M.H.O., with annual report showing 55 deaths during year; rate 11.1 per 1,000. 90 live births, 2 still births; 1 maternal death, 1 death under 1 year. Communicable disease—scarlet fever, 14, 1 death; diphtheria 6, 1 death; measles 43; mumps 12; whooping cough 21; chickenpox 10; tuberculosis 2 cases and 2 deaths. Milk supply from local dairies. Total expenditure by Board of Health, \$331.98.

The Township of Pickering sent in an account for \$215.52, amount expended by Pickering on Markham townline.

Resolutions were passed:— That L.O.L. No. 228 be granted the use of the basement of the Township Hall for regular monthly meetings and also the use of the main hall for one occasion free, providing that the proceeds for the latter meeting be given charity, for the rental of \$35 for 1927.

That a grant of \$25.00 be paid to the Treasurer of Unionville Public Library, also a grant of \$15.00 to Markham Public Library.

That the Treasurer pay D.M. Hoover the sum of \$40.00 for one sheep killed and three injured as valued by Truman Holden, sheep valuator.
