

**UXBRIDGE TWP. COUNCIL**

The inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Township Council was held at Goodwood on Monday, Jan. 10th. Members elect present as follows: Reeve, Chas. Lee; Deputy-reeve, George E. Todd; Councilors, Isaac Catherwood, Thos. H. Lewis and Daniel Wagg. All were re-elected by acclamation, and after subscribing to declaration of office took their seats at the council board.

Minutes of final meeting of last year was read and confirmed.

Among communications were the following:

Sick Children's Hospital requesting a grant to same. No action.

S. L. Squire, sec-treas. Ontario Good Roads Association giving dates of convention, Feb'y 22, 23 and 24, and asking council to send delegates. Control Board requesting pass bylaw appointing a force, the Act, as any fines same would be pay-ship. No action.

Applications were received as follows: For Assessor, Ralph Faulkner and Ernest Johnston; for Auditors, Fred W. Johnston, W. G. Cassie, Fred Reasby and Russell Feasby; School Attendance Officer, E. W. Davis.

Mr. E. W. Davis was re-appointed School Attendance Officer at a salary of \$40.00.

The whole Council and Road Superintendent were appointed as delegates to attend the Good Road Convention.

Standing Committees for current year are:

Finance—Todd, Lewis and Catherwood.

Road and Bridge—Reeve and Catherwood.

Printing—Catherwood, Lewis and Wagg.

Indigent—Lewis, Todd and Wagg.

Contingent—Wagg, Lee and Todd.

A bylaw was passed appointing F. W. Johnston and W. G. Cassie as Auditors; Distin McDonald, collector of taxes, and Ernest Morgason a member of the local Board of Health

for 1928. No change was made in the office of Assessor.

Clerk was instructed by Council to procure six copies of Municipal World for use of members of council.

Mr. Wagg gave notice that he would at next meeting of council move for leave to introduce a bylaw for appointing Pound Keepers, Sheep Valuers and Fence Viewers.

The following were appointed as members of the board of management of the Goodwood Community Park and Athletic Field: Chas. Lee and George E. Todd, Reeve and deputy-reeve, R. E. Darling, J. F. Reid, Thoms Armstrong, John Ashenbush and Mrs. E. W. Davis. The first two mentioned for one year, the others for two years.

Mr. Lewis, seconded by Mr. Catherwood, moves that "Whereas, the County of Ontario having purchased some 373 acres of land in the Township of Uxbridge for Reforestation purposes, and whereas the Township of Uxbridge has not received any taxes on said lands since it was taken over by the County, and as said land is situated about equally in School Section No. 3 and 11 of said Township, and as the loss of school rates on this land makes it hard on the school supporters in said sections, and as we do not receive any revenue from those lands towards keeping up the roads around it, and as we are informed that other Counties are paying the school rates on their reforestation lands."

Therefore this Council of the Township of Uxbridge respectfully requests the in future the County of Ontario pay at least the school rates on the above mentioned property, we consider that a small amount, as in future when any revenue is derived from said lands in the way of sale of timber etc. the whole County will benefit thereby. And that our clerk mail a copy of this resolution to the clerk of Ontario County in time for the January session of the County Council. Carried unanimously.

**30 MINUTES OVERTIME TO BEAT MARKHAM**

Over 400 fans crowded into the Stouffville Arena on Monday evening to witness one of the finest exhibitions of hockey ever staged in this district in respect to the efforts put forth by both sides to win. Stouffville coming out on the top side of a 4 to 3 victory after one-half hour of gruelling over-time play. Never from the first drop of the gutta percha did the contest become one-sided until after eleven o'clock when the victors were finally declared. So exciting was the contest that even the spectators were exhausted when the final gong rang.

The visitors quickly came back with two goals, but just before the gong rang Ken Reesor evened up the score again, two all. The third stanza was a non-score period like the first, with Stouffville having a little the best of the play, but were ineffective in getting to the nets. Three periods of overtime of ten minutes each were required to finish the game. The first ten produced no score with both teams playing strenuous hockey, first one having the best of the rubber, and then the other. In the second ten, Stouffville notched a goal off a nice combination by Lehman and Lewis. Markham tallied a few minutes later which again tied the score, three all. Both teams showed signs of becoming weary in the third fixture of overtime, but the home boys fought on and finally tallied off Clendinning. With but six minutes to go they were able to hold the visitors off their nets, and thus end what was setting in for an endurance contest.

Garland Lehman and Allan Hoover starred for the locals, Ken Reesor played his usual strong game and was very effective. In fact all the boys worked hard and deserve credit for their victory over the strong Markham aggregation.
