**ANOTHER GOOD SALE**

Mr. Simeon Hoover who had farmed at lot 25, concession 8, Markham for more than 30 years, disposed of his farm stock and implements over the auction block last Thursday, and will now take a well-earned rest from active farming. The property will be worked by Elmore and Clarence Barkey, but Mr. Hoover and his wife will continue to live in a portion of the residence.  
 Thursday's auction sale drew one of the largest crowds of the season, despite the fact that there was quite a heavy fall of snow came unexpected just at that time, making heavy roads. Prices ruled high for many articles, and for some of the live stock, but the feature of the sale was the good average bids realized in all lines offered for sale. The highest cow went at \$130 to Mr. Wellman, Headford, while two others sold at \$115 each to Lotions and Brillingers. W. Pellat got a nice one at \$110, and the others in the sale ran around the \$100 mark.  
 Three horses sold well considering the quality, the highest animal relieving someone's purse of \$135. Hogs sold better than at other sales indicating that the hog market is improving. Feed prices were particularly high, ensilage, in a ten foot silo bringing \$7.50 a foot, while barley sold at 85c. bushel and mixed grain at 70c.  
 There was a big list of implements, many of which had served at least one man a lifetime, but good care retained their value, and most articles demanded a good price. The entire sale realized \$4,100, with an unusually large cash payment, although liberal terms were advertised. This speaks well for the financial condition of this section of the farming community in Ontario.  
 F. W. Silversides was on the auction block, assisted by Alvin Farmer the cub auctioneer.
