### GIVEN A JOB.

Alex. Hodge of Beeton Fame to be  
 Employed at Government Farm,  
 Hon. Lincoln Goldie, Provincial  
 Secretary, has announced that Alex.  
 Hodge of Beeton, is to be given a  
 position at the government farm at  
 Whitby, where it is expected that he  
 will be able to do a little work in a  
 supervisory capacity.  
 Hodge has not yet recovered from  
 the injuries received in the struggle  
 in the Beeton robbery attack, when  
 he killed his assailant with his hands  
 last July. His left hand is useless  
 and he is said to be practically penni-  
 less. His plight was recently called  
 to the attention of the government.

### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

After hearing evidence in the case  
 of Oswald Love, of Udon, charged  
 with the theft of a cow from Oliver  
 Denny. Love was committed for  
 trial at the next court of competent  
 jurisdiction. Accused was alleged  
 to have purchased a cow at a sale at  
 Myrtle and to have given a note for  
 same which was not in accordance  
 to what was agreed upon as to en-  
 dorsement. When the note was  
 turned in for collection it could not  
 be realized on, and Love, it is alleg-  
 ed, retained possession of the cow,  
 with the result that theft was  
 charged. The Court ruled that the  
 evidence was sufficient to place Love  
 upon his trial.

### DISTRICT AND GENERAL.

The late Tacheus Burden of Port  
 Perry who left an estate of \$42,000,  
 made a bequest of \$10,500 to the  
 Children's Shelter of Ontario County.  
 This is to the benefit of the people  
 of Uxbridge Tp., and all other munici-  
 palities in the county. The late Mr.  
 Burden left the remainder of his  
 estate to other public institutions, he  
 having no children.

The cost to the County of Ontario  
 of that portion of the Whitby-Lin-  
 say provincial highway from the 7th  
 concession of Whitby Township to  
 Manchester, completed last year, and  
 for maintenance of the rest of the  
 highway within the county, will be  
 \$52,000, or 20 per cent. of the total  
 cost. A bill for this large amount  
 was presented to the Ontario County  
 Council last week, having been re-  
 ceived from the Provincial Highways  
 Department, and caused the county  
 legislators to gasp. Under the Act,  
 however, the county has no option  
 but to foot the bill, and it will have  
 to be provided for in the County tax  
 budget for 1928 on good roads ac-  
 count. The \$52,000 bill, which was  
 referred to the County Roads Com-  
 mittee, brought home the fact that  
 while good roads, particularly pav-  
 ements, are very desirable, and are  
 becoming more plentiful, their cost  
 is becoming a heavy financial burden  
 upon the counties, made up princi-  
 pally of the smaller urban and rural  
 places.

### COUNTY ASSESSMENT-UP

At the session of York County  
 Council last week the assessment of  
 the county was increased by nearly  
 two millions over last year, most of  
 which was added to the southern  
 end of the county where the expan-  
 sion of the city makes a noticeable  
 growth in the suburbs each year.  
 While some of the towns and villages  
 were decreased, Stouffville got a  
 boost of \$4000, which will not ma-  
 terially increase our county tax, but  
 it indicates that we are going ahead  
 if the increase is a just one. Mark-  
 ham village received a slight re-  
 duction. Whitchurch Township was  
 increased \$10,000 and Markham Tp.  
 \$14,000.

The total equalized assessment of  
 the county for 1928 was fixed at  
 \$102,026,587, showing an increase  
 of \$1,930,232 over last year's total  
 assessment and an increase over the  
 local assessment of the sum of  
 \$63,610.

The assessment of the township  
 municipalities was increased from the  
 sum of \$76,146,824, as fixed by their  
 assessors, to the sum of \$78,027,973.  
 Ten towns and villages were increas-  
 ed, and five received decreases.
