**MARKHAM T.P. COUNCIL**

The regular meeting of the Markham township council was held at the Township hall, Unionville on Monday Feb. 6th with Reeve Gohn in the chair and all the members present. The road superintendent was authorized to attend the superintendents' convention in Toronto this month and the whole council were appointed delegates to attend the annual convention of the Ontario Good Road Association. The clerk was authorized to forward the annual fee of \$5.00 to the organization. The usual grant of \$15.00 was made to the Richmond Hill Public Library.

The council took no action on the request to join the Ontario Municipal Association. The monthly report of the Medical Health Officer showed the following list of cases for the month of January: scarlet fever 3 German Measles 6; Mumps 1 and Chicken pox 5.

Mr. C. E. Stiver addressed the council regarding the many neglected cemeteries in the township. He pointed out the new law in the matter which made the township responsible and urged that some action be taken in the matter which he felt was a very important one. Reeve Gohn assured him that it would be considered by the council.

A by-law was passed fixing the rental for the Township hall at Unionville as follows:— Basement \$2.00 per night and upper hall to organizations resident in the township of Markham \$4. per night and to non-residents \$10. per night. All arrangements for the hiring of the hall will be taken care of by the Janitor.

A petition signed by members of ratepayers was received asking that a new school section should be formed at Milliken composed of a section of Markham and a section of Scarborough townships. It was pointed out that the school serving a portion of the proposed new union school section is now over-crowded and many pupils had to walk great distances to school with the result many were irregular in attendance. No action was taken by the council as it was felt that more information should be available.

Mr. McKinnon of Cashel was heard respecting the needs of a poor family in his locality and he was instructed to make provisions for them.

## THE STRAP IN SCHOOLS

Respecting the newspapers controversy as to abolishing corporal punishment in public schools, our view is that it would be unwise as the abolishing of capital punishment in the state has proved to be. Where it has been tried out it has resulted in a rapid increase of homicidal crime. If mothers who object to the use of the strap in the school could be depended on to use it in the home it might be dispensed with in the schools, but as long as the children are brought up on the theory of their unrestrained self-expression, it will be wise to retain the strap in schools as a deterrent, in the case of wilfully bad and rebellious youngsters who defy authority and invite the penalty.

Teachers must be allowed the right, subject of course to appeal, to decide when the extreme penalty for refusal to submit to discipline is incurred and to administer the penalty if necessary discipline is to be maintained.

There are teachers who manage to dispense with corporal punishment and to maintain necessary discipline, and who do not understand why all teachers should not be able to, but they are rather the exception.

As long as home discipline dispenses with the slipper and strap, teachers will encounter cases where the alternatives are the strap, expulsion of the pupil or resignation of the teacher.
