

OBITUARY OF DANIEL B. HOOVER

Born October 27th, 1833, died Feb. 12, 1928, Aged 95 years

"Then there came forth a summons for Mr. Stand-fast. The contents whereof were that he must prepare for a change of life, for his Master was not willing that he should be so far from Him any longer."

The above quotation from "Pilgrims Progress" came to our mind as there was related to the representative of The Tribune the salient features of the life of Daniel B. Hoover, who for the whole period of his long life lived upon the farm, lot 34, con. 6, Markham Township, 3 miles west of Stouffville, and who passed over the Great Divide on Sunday morning, Feb. 12, 1928, in his 95th year.

His father was one Daniel Hoover who came from Pennsylvania when 17 years of age, and for some years was a miller in the village of Stouffville, the race of which mill was revealed in good order two years ago when the new post office was excavated for. As he was subject to asthma, the occupation in the mill had to be abandoned, and having purchased the 200 acres for \$1200, he proceeded to clear the present homestead. He took to himself a wife in the person of Fanny Barkey of the 8th concession, the daughter of a Pennsylvania pioneer. They commenced housekeeping on this lot 34 in the 6th.

To them were born five children, the youngest being Daniel B., the subject of this sketch.

It will be of interest to note that at the time of the coming from Penn that Toronto, then known as "Muddy York," consisted of 5 or 6 houses on the water front, and that the only place for the grinding of their wheat into flour was in that village to which all grain was carried on horse back in four-bushel sacks, some of which remained in the family until a few years ago. On his death the property passed into the hands of his youngest son, having been in possession of the family for more than a 100-years.

After taking a wife in the person of Suzanne Shurk of the third con. of Markham, the couple occupied part of the house in which both he and his parents lived and died. For many years they lived in happiness, one son Henry being born to them.

Mrs. Hoover died 11 years ago at a ripe age. Daniel B. Hoover was a man of more than usual ability and character. On the wall of the room in which he died is a striking likeness of her late Majesty Queen Victoria, a black and white pencil sketch of decided merit, which was drawn by the late Mr. Hoover. He spoke three languages fairly fluently, having mastered the French through the aid of two Frenchmen employed on his farm years ago. The German and English were both mother-tongues to him. In politics Mr. Hoover was a Liberal. The late Mr. Hoover was possessed of a very retentive memory, and has left behind data for the compilation of a family history that a future historian may be glad to use.

He secured his education at a frame school house that stood on the 7th concession, and which was afterwards purchased by him and is now being used as a tool and drive shed on the farm where he died. Mr. Hoover was a man also of intensive energy, and at the age of 92 assisted his son Henry to shingle a building on the place.

Three years ago he suffered a stroke, from which he never fully recovered, and during that time has had constant assistance. By means of a wheel chair he was able to enjoy short visits out of doors in suitable weather, his latter days being made as comfortable as possible by the devoted attention of his only son Henry. Up to within ten minutes of his death his mind was clear and his end was one of peace.

The funeral on Tuesday was attended by one of the largest concourses seen in Markham Township, all possible respect being paid to the oldest resident.

The short service at the house was in charge of Bro. Samuel Wideman of Almbra, who also conducted the committal service at the grave.

The public service at the Wideman church was presided over by Bro. Leonard Hoover, the interment being in the Wideman cemetery alongside his beloved wife.

The pall bearers were: Christian Wideman, Robson, Jewitt, Noah Wideman, Joseph Hoover, Jacob Grove, and George Gower.

The late Mr. Hoover was a devoted member of the Mennonite Church, and could always be relied upon for moral and financial help in all worthy causes. In age and feebleness extreme, What can a helpless soul redeem. Jesus! My only joy thou art, Strength of my falling flesh and heart Oh could I catch one smile from Thee And drop into eternity.
