### WHITCHURCH TP. COUNCIL

At the regular February meeting of the Whitchurch Township Council last week, the sum of \$20,000 was appropriated for expenditures on roads throughout the township during the year 1928. This action is taken in compliance with the Provincial Highways Improvement Act, and on this expenditure will be made the annual grant obtained from the government.

Reference was made by members of the council and the reeve to the sad loss sustained by one of their colleagues, Councillor Ross Ratchiff, and the clerk was instructed to forward to him a suitable letter of condolence.

The usual bylaw was passed appointing the fence viewers, pound keepers, road foreman, and sheep valuers, their being little change from last year in the list.

The auditors' report was laid on the table for the council's consideration, and was accepted by them.

After hearing the advisability of having insurance to protect the township against accidents brought by people using the roads, it was decided to renew the premium with the Globe Indemnity Co., at a cost of \$247.98. One accident against the municipality might involve a sum many times the amount of this premium.

O. R. Tranmer presented a claim for sheep killed and injured by dogs. For one animal killed and one damaged he was awarded \$20.

### UXBRIDGE TWP. COUNCIL

Met on Feb'y 18th at Goodwood. Members all present. The clerk read the following communications:

The Dept. Public Highways, acknowledging receipt of returns for Road Supt., showing in detail work performed on our roads during year 1927, road construction \$2,584.13, bridges \$365.61, maintenance and repairs \$5,257.14, machinery and repairs \$139.44. Superintendence \$533.00. Total expenditure of \$9,379.32, entitling township to a subsidy of \$2,903.67.

W. O. Webster, clerk of Scott Tp. sent a copy of resolution requesting rescinding of agreement with Uxbridge Tp. re upkeep of townline.

R. C. Muir, Dept. of Highways, quoting an amendment to the Highway Act, whereby a Road Superintendent once appointed by bylaw and approved by the Minister cannot be discharged except by repealing or amending bylaw also approved of in writing by the Minister.

J. N. Lapointe, sec-treas. Eastern Ontario Good Roads Association, asking for our Twp. delegates to meet them at Labor Temple, Toronto to sign petition to Dept. of Highways that all expenditures on Provincial Highways be borne by the Province, and that the subsidy on Twp. roads be increased to 50 per cent, and that the tax on gasoline be increased to 5c. per gal. to provide for same.

W. G. Cassie, one of the auditors, brought in report which was received and adopted, same showing the Township to be in a first-class financial position.

Manager Standard Bank at Uxbridge form for appointing same as banker of the Township of Uxbridge, approved and completed by council.

### STANDARD BANK GROWTH LARGEST IN HISTORY

They indicate that notwithstanding the strenuous competition that exists in the Canadian Banking field, the Standard Bank has been again able to attract to itself its full share of new business during the year and to again increase the proportion of the banking business of Canada handled by it.
