### MUST PAY THE TAX

Ontario County Council must pay the school taxes on the property in the Township of Uxbridge purchased and utilized for forestation purposes, and the bill will amount to about \$70.00. A reference to the Provincial Forestry Department as to who should pay these taxes was made by the Council three weeks ago, and the Department ruled that the County was liable. In the township of Uxbridge there are over 900 acres of land now in use for Reforestation purposes. At the Council session on Wednesday morning there was a long discussion when Reeve Pollard, of Uxbridge introduced a motion that the county pay these taxes. The Council went into committee of the whole on the motion and it was carried. It is understood that other counties who have reforestation plantations pay all school section taxes in connection therewith—Uxbridge Times.
