### DO WE NEED COUNTY COUNCILS?

Will the time ever come when County Councils will be done away with? It is recognized and admitted on ever hand that this country is overgoverned, and now comes a big newspaper discussion on the subject of wiping out the county councils. They are claimed by some people to be the most wasteful of all four legislative bodies, and the charge may be well founded.

By those in favor of their abandonment it is reasoned that their work could be easily divided between the municipal councils and the provincial government, which would have the added advantage of bringing the latter body into closer touch with the needs of the municipalities. Just now in this County of York, we are faced with the problem of more county accommodation at the county building in Toronto to take care of the increasing number of members, but a move to cut down the membership would meet more with the approval of the people throughout the county.

In Fergus, says the Action Free Press, much comment has been made and a plan sort of formulated for that town's withdrawal from the county council. There were many threats last year of towns withdrawing from county government. In numerous other circles same things are discussed quite frequently. And why is it that such comment seems general where the work of the county council is considered? The reason is simple enough. The county councils have outlived their usefulness. They have been expensive in their upkeep and much of the work done by them could be better dealt with by the local municipal bodies, who are in closer touch with matters now dealt with by the county councils. They have been given too much scope of activity. The more enquiry there is into their activities the more will be the demand for curbing of their powers or for the abolition of the body entirely. Every municipality in this county is groaning under the weight of taxation imposed by the county council. How much longer will they be allowed to continue with the everlasting burden?"

### DAMAGES ASKED FOR DROWNED HORSE

Claremont Equine Dies on the Job pulling His Master Through

D. B. Taylor, the Claremont dough-puncher, lost a valuable delivery horse through the animal being drowned in the harness while delivering bread along the 4th concession of Uxbridge Township, opposite lots 15 and 16. There was said to be a temporary flood there at the time, but Taylor took a chance on getting through the roadway with such disastrous results. Mr. Taylor has presented a bill to the Uxbridge Township council at the March meeting asking compensation to the tune of \$130. As the council is protected against liability in such accidents through a policy they carry in the Globe Indemnity Co. that organization will have charge of any settlement, protecting the municipality from all liability. For this service the council pay a premium of \$177.00; and it was something of a co-incident that the policy was just renewed at the meeting when Mr. Taylor's claim was presented.

Reeve Chas. E. Lee presided over the gathering, with all the members present.

A. W. Christian, County clerk, advised council that the council would pay the school tax on the land set apart for reforestation purposes in Uxbridge, to the amount of \$70 per year. This will be good news to school sections No's. 3-11-12 where the lands are located.

Miss Myrtle Watson, on behalf of the Women's Institute requested the council to investigate the needs of the Crittenden family.

It was decided to sell the pine trees on the sideling opposite lots 15-16, concession 4, by auction

Council decided that all accounts for work on roads must be written on the regulation blue prints, and certified by the Road Foreman of the road on which the work was performed. Accounts sent in otherwise will not be considered.

Council also in conjunction with the Road Superintendent went over a map of the Township, and revised and rearranged the section of road for each Road Foreman, and also reappointed and appointed foremen for same, those appointed will receive due notice of appointment.

### LOCAL HEALTH BULLETIN

#### MILK

It is an accepted fact that milk is the most valuable article of diet we possess. Because there is no other article of diet than can take its place it may be called, without any exaggeration, and essential food.

Milk is a food. Milk is a complete food. Milk contains all the substances needed for building up bone and muscle in growing children, and replacing the worn-out tissues in adults.

It is wrong to think of milk as a sort of accessory to be used in tea or coffee, or on foods, or merely as a beverage for children. Milk is an economical, complete food. Milk and milk products should be part of the diet of everyone, young and old, but particularly of growing children. Every child needs at least one pint of milk a day in order that he may accumulate sufficient of the materials for building up a strong, healthy body. No other food can be given the child which will supply, in such quantity or quality, these necessary building materials.

There is no difference of opinion, amongst those who have studied the question of diet, on the subject that milk and milk products are most valuable foods and should be used by everybody.

If children are to grow into adult life with strong, healthy bodies, they must drink milk during their years of growth.
