This Mariner's Shark Excels Jonah's Whale

South Sea Captain's Log Tells of Finding Father and Son Alive in Captured Sea Tiger

A Honolulu newspaper reports that a veteran of the Pacific Ocean, Captain Clinton Jones, now living near the Hawaiian capital, is preparing his log books for publication. These cover more than half a century of adventure in the Central and Southern Pacific. In negotiating with publishers the ancient mariner has sent them samples of his sea diaries. A fragment that has reached us reads as follows:

"Here is a half-hitch from the log of the bark Neptune of which I was master in 1877. This records the strange story of the shark, the man, the grindstone and the child."

"The Neptune was bound from Santiago to Boston, touching at Cienfuegos. Senior Ricardo Iglesias and his two children were aboard as passengers."

"One morning we were hauling around Cape Cruz when one of the Don's children fell overboard. The ship was making six knots at the time. We tacked ship, leaving the foreyard aback the ship's head. There was much excitement and everybody threw life preservers or any gear they could get their hands on overboard."

"The German carpenter even threw his grindstone over in the excitement. It took about twenty minutes to get a boat out, but all that was rescued was some of the gear that had been thrown out. The child and the grindstone were not recovered."

"After about forty-five minutes the boat returned to the ship. The Don was greatly excited and the little boy's sister was in tears. Breakfast was prepared and we had hardly seated ourselves when there came a cry of 'Man overboard!' It developed that the Don in his grief had jumped over the side. I ordered everything flat aback and a boat was put out, but there was no sign of the Don. The boat was hauled up again and the ship was put back on her course, but she had hardly gathered way when a shark took a hook that was out."

"I brought the ship into the wind with the mainyard aback and we finally got the shark alongside. A tackle was swung from the mainyard and a bowline was run down and looped over the shark's tail."

"As the shark was hauled on deck he coughed up what was inside of him; first came the Don and then the grindstone, and finally the boy. The Don was grasping a long dagger and said the boy had been turning the grindstone for him while he sharpened the dagger, preparatory to cutting his way out of the shark."

Happy Belgium

Philadelphia—Belgium, the little nation which stood up against outstanding odds in the Great War, has "come back."

Prince Albert de Ligne, Belgian Ambassador to the United States, speaking before the American Academy of Political and Social Science, said, his home country, "after nearly ten years of strenuous endeavor, has been reconstructed and placed on a firm foundation, physically, economically and financially."

"Our houses have been rebuilt," he asserted, "our factories reconstructed and equipped, our basic industries to-day are producing more than their pre-war output, our people are profitably engaged, and there is no unemployment problem."

Mr. King is trying to use the St. Lawrence question to bargain for better fiscal terms with the Government of the United States. Whether such rumors are true, we do not know. What we do know, and what we feel very strongly, is that when any Canadian Cabinet, be it Liberal or Conservative, begins writing notes to Washington about the disposition of something that is the property of the people of Canada, then the people of Canada have a right to know what is in those notes.

Pictures of Men Dead 1,700 Years

Scientists Amazed at Discoveries of Explorers in Turkestan

London—Pictures of men who have been dead 1700 years but had the appearance of having just died, even to long beards intact, were shown on the screen before amazed scientists of the Royal Anthropological Institute recently.

"I feel quite certain that when the explorers get into the centre of the eastern part of Chinese Turkestan we shall find evidence of civilization that will astound us," said Sir Arthur Keith, who gave the lantern lecture. After stating that there is nothing new under the sun, Sir Arthur passed around a skull of the "first flapper" which only the most careful examination showed was that of a woman of 30 rather than that of a young girl. Another revelation of Sir Arthur's was that England is developing an Armenoid type without having had any admixture from Armelia.

Old Almanacs

Almanacs have to some extent lost their old prestige. The supposedly omniscient almanac of other days contained not only the calendar, but many astrological prophecies and long-range weather forecasts. To-day political, statistical and historical information forms the greater part of the contents of almanacs, which are used mostly in business and not in homes.

Almanacs date back to early civilization. It is known that the Greeks and Romans had them. Some of the oldest almanacs in existence were published during the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. Purbach, the astronomer, is said to have published the first printed almanac in 1450.

The Almanach Liegeois was typical in that it contained dire prophecies. This almanac, which became famous by predicting the end of Mme. du Barry's career, found a great circulation in rural France and provided for those who could not read an easily comprehensible system of symbols. So great was the influence of these almanacs over the superstitious that at one time almanacs were banned in France.

Bradford, in 1657, published the first American almanac, but Franklin's "Poor Richard" was the first of any importance.

The Hagerstown and Country Almanac, published in 1787 by John Gruber, also became famous. It is still issued. Washington first received his name as "The Father of His Country" in 1779 when the Pennsylvania German Almanac so hailed him. The publication appeared with a cover picturing Fame, holding in one hand a medallion of Washington and in the other a trumpet. The medallion was labeled "Washington" and the trumpet blew forth the words "Des Landes Vater—The Father of His Country."

Bring in Newfoundland

Toronto Mail and Empire (Cons.): As long as Newfoundland exists as a separate Dominion, there will always be the danger of the United States getting into treaty relations with it that will enable the latter country to exploit the natural resources of the Island and Labrador to its own advantage and to the detriment of the country. Newfoundland will be more favorably disposed to listen to proposals to include it in the Canadian union if the King Government wastes to implement the letter the recommendations of the Duncan Commission in respect to the Maritime Provinces. It should be the study of our Government to make the Maritime Provinces one of the prosperous sections of this Dominion.
