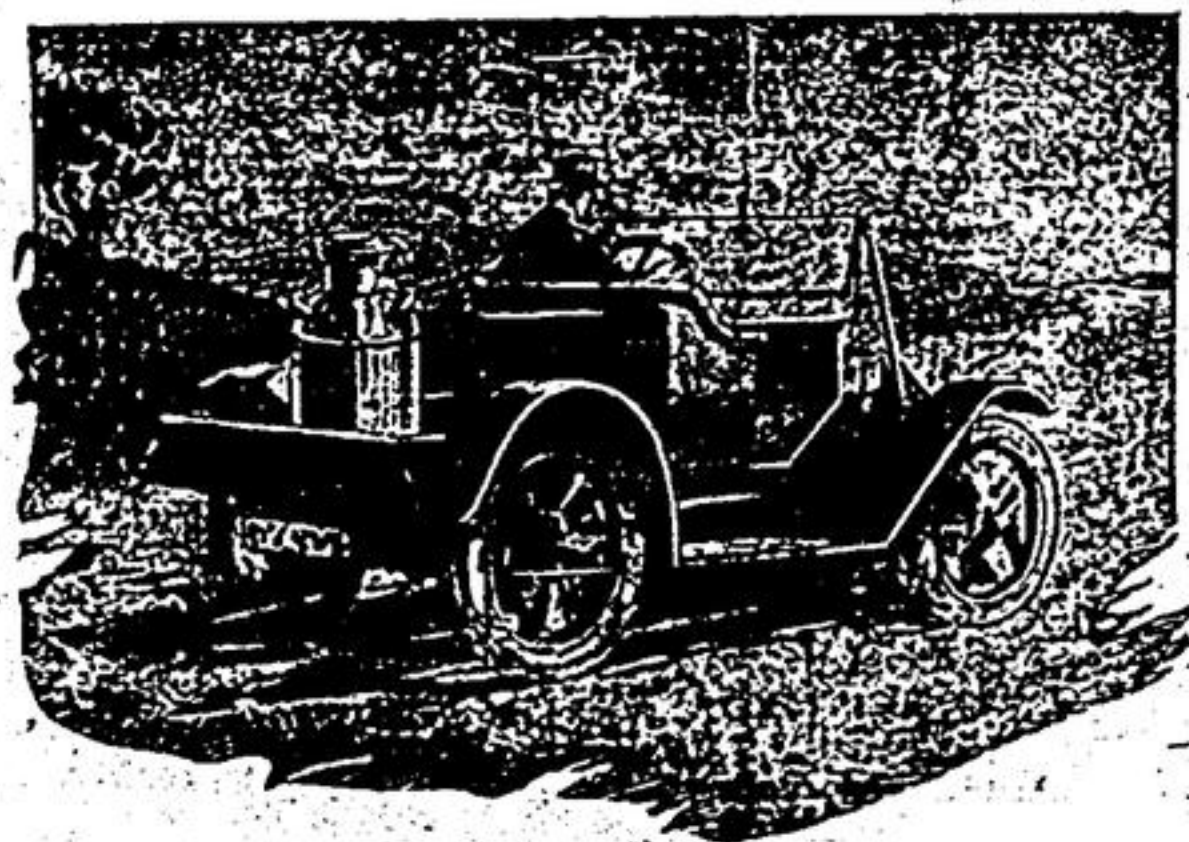
Ten Years Ago

IN DAYS OF YORE

From The Tribune files of Dec. 1889
Thirty-Eight Years Ago

A mock parliament is being formed.

R. J. Daley is in the field for reeveship.

Dec. 20th and the roads almost impassable for mud.

The last recorded census of the village recorded 1200 population.

Miss Maggie Lehman and her sister Mary are enjoying a visit at Altona.

Miss Jennie Stouffer has completed her course at the Newmarket Model School.

On Dec. 16th, Miss Alice Sangster was united in marriage to Chester Brown. Rev. W. Percy tying the knot.

Taylor & Sangster, barristers, advertised \$500,000 to loan, and F. W. Hill, barrister, also has a big sum to loan at 5 1/2 per cent.

Market quotations: Fall wheat 90c., flour \$2.60 bbl., potatoes 50c. bag, butter 16 to 19c., eggs 25c., geese 7c. lb., turkeys 11c. and chickens 40 to 50c. pair.

1200 people attended a big concert in Daley's hall provided by Fred Spofford, who only a few months previous moved to Stouffville from Toronto, to become the leading business man.

Notice of dissolution of partnership is given, existing between S. Burkholder and J. Burkholder, cabinet makers, undertakers and furniture dealers. The first named will continue the business.

Under the church notes, the following denominations through the pastors invited the public to Christmas services: Methodist, Rev. Geo. Brown; Congregational, Rev. J. Unsworth; Presbyterian, Rev. H. W. Knowles; Baptist, Rev. Mr. Barker; Church of England, Rev. Mr. Osborne
