Tribune Files of May 1889
 39 Years Ago

Wm. Simpson is building a large and handsome barn on his Lakeview farm at Ballantrae.

Isaac Lemon and R. B. Hastings, both of Lemonville, each lost a valuable horse from inflammation, on the same day.

Licenses were granted in Uxbridge Township to A. Brown, Altona; Jas. Todd and John Higgins, Goodwood; E. Lewis, Glen Major and L. Hutchison, Roseville.

W. B. Sanders sold 1200 dozen of eggs on Monday to J. W. Curtis of Port Perry. Most of these were purchased on the market during the past week.

The law firm of Dickson, Taylor & McCullough whose office in this village is in charge of F. H. Sangster has been dissolved. Mr. R. A. Dickson retiring. Business will be carried on at the old office by Messrs. A. M. Taylor, W. J. McCullough and S. W. Burns.

A special meeting of the school board was called to devise some means to relieve the overcrowding in the lowest division in charge of Miss Wismer. There are 80 pupils in the room, while the aggregate attendance in the public school is 200. The expediency of hiring a fifth teacher was decided on.

Willie Miller of the Mansion House the 13-year-old son of the late Elijah Miller was killed at the crossing on Main street. Standing on one railway track watching the train on the other track, he did not notice some freight cars slowly moving toward him. He was struck down and died within a few hours from frightful injuries.

BLOOMINGTON

This community was grieved on Thursday to learn of the death of Mrs. W. H. Tranmer, which occurred at the home of her cousin in Midland where she had gone on a visit. The remains were brought to the late home here from whence the funeral took place on Saturday to Bloomington cemetery. Mrs. Tranmer was 71 years of age, her maiden name being Miss Watson. She was born in King Township, but came here as a young bride and had spent half a century of happy married life here. William Tranmer, her husband, died nine years ago. An only child, Otto Tranmer, survives the parents. Mrs. N.E. Fairles of Stouffville is a sister to the deceased. Rev. A. Laycock, conducted the funeral service, the departed one being a devout Methodist all her days. He was assisted by Rev. A. R. Sanderson of St. Paul's church, Pickering.

SOUTH ONTARIO FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The South Ontario Football Association held a meeting at Brooklin on May 3rd. A good representation of the district was present. The following officers were elected for 1928: Honorary Prests. W. E. DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Brook Township Hall at Sunderland was crowded to the doors last Friday evening when the citizens turned out en masse to honor the retiring clerk of the township, Francis Doble, who has been on duty for 21 years, also to witness the unveiling of portraits of General Brock, after whom the township was named, and of all reeves who have served the municipality since its inception.

Markham Economist—"Benjamin Stedman and Abram Rush, of Toronto, were arrested on Thursday by Township Constables Jas. Clayton and Percival Petch, on a charge of chicken thieving. Thursday morning shortly after, midnight two young men of Unionville were motoring home from a dance in the Markham Orange Hall, and noticed a truck standing on the sideroad a little distance from the Eckardt bridge. Their suspicion being aroused they phoned to constables, and a hot chase ensued and on reaching Unionville the truck with two men in it headed north. Ditching the truck a short distance south of the railway cross-

ing and jumping from the car the two men made their escape. The truck was taken in charge by the police and found to belong to Stedman, who was arrested shortly after daylight making his way to the city. In the captured truck were crates containing 24 fowl, afterwards found to have been stolen, 7 from Ed. W. Robinson and the balance from A. Crosby of Markham village. Stedman questioned on his arrest, said Rush was his companion and he was also placed under arrest. The chickens were identified by Robinson and Crosby, and returned to them by Constable Walker of Markham. Crosby's chickens were valuable pure bred birds".

OSHAWA PRESBYTERY

The Oshawa Presbytery of the United Church met in St. Paul's Church Pickering, on Thursday, April 26th. There was a large attendance of ministers and laymen, and a heavy docket of business was transacted. Rev. A.M. Irwin, chairman, and Rev. P. L. Jull, secretary, were in charge. Resignations were received from

Rev. C. W. DeMille, Oshawa, King St.; Rev. Dr. Dougall, Oshawa, Simcoe St.; Rev. E. F. Swayne, Myrtle; Rev. Jos. Barnes, Greenwood; Rev. E. F. Cooke, Newcastle; Rev. F.G. Weir, Scugog, and Rev. A. R. Sanderson, St. Paul's, Pickering. Invitations were received from King St., Oshawa to Rev. C. E. Cragg of Sarala; Simcoe St., Oshawa, to Rev. E. Harstone of Campbellford; Newcastle, to Rev. W. P. Rogers of Tweed; Myrtle, to Rev. R. J. Merriam of Napanee; and Greenwood, to Rev. W. S. Smart of Cherry Valley. Those were approved by Presbytery, and forwarded to the Settlement Committee.

A request from Whitesale pastoral charge to be transferred to East Toronto Presbytery was approved and sent forward to Conference.

Rev. J.U. Robins and Mr. W. R. Strike were nominated for the Settlement Committee; Rev. A.M. Irwin, Rev. S.J. Maxwell, Messrs. O.M. Alger and W.R. Strike were nominated as Commissioners to the General Council which meets in Winnipeg in September next.

The next regular meeting of Presbytery will be held at Clarendon in September.
