Poincare Looks to U.S. For New Wine Market

He went on to say that "if wine were harmful it would be known. One would have known it long ago."

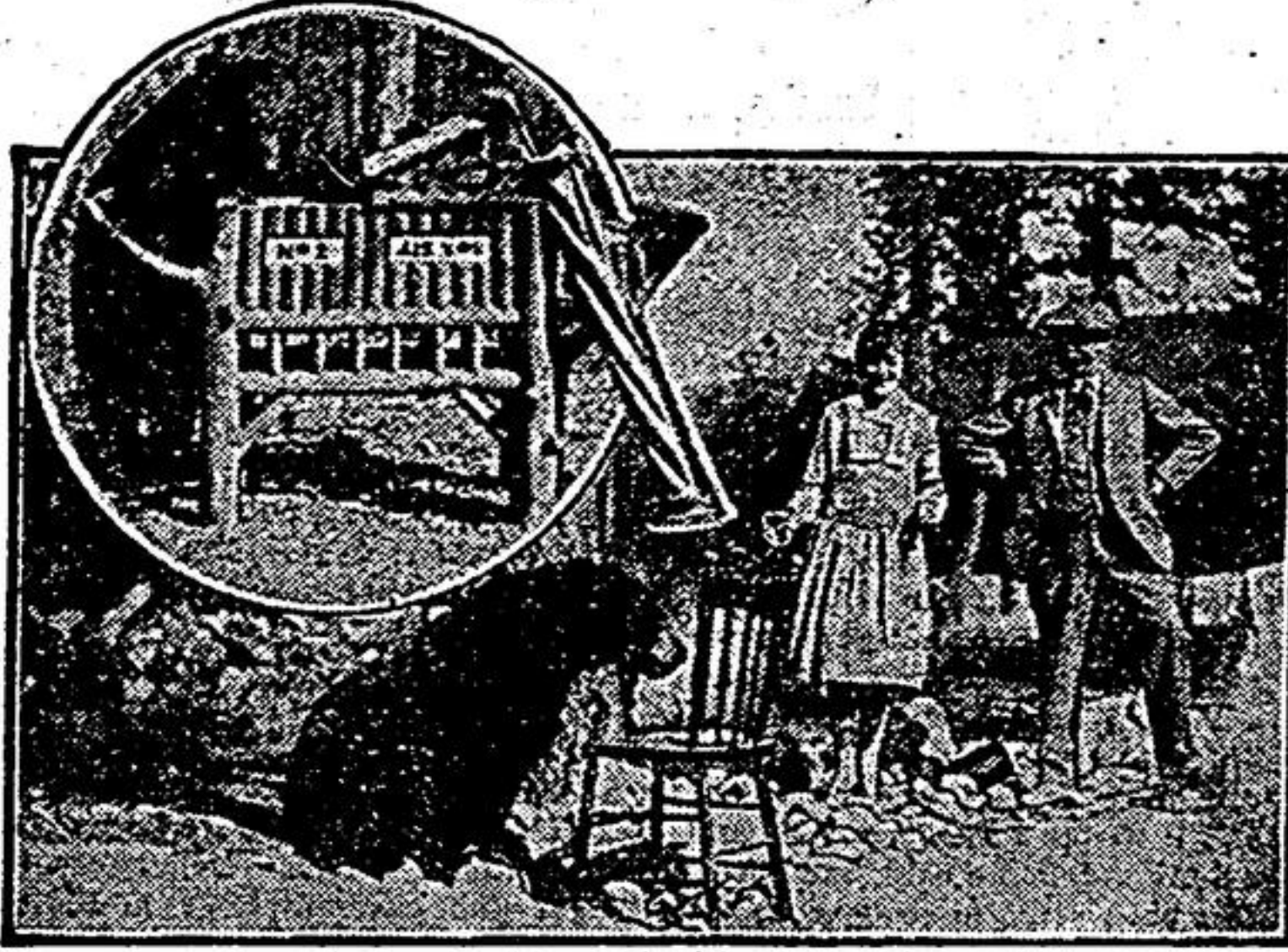

A Pretty Way to Serve Strawberries

A simple and pretty way to serve large strawberries is to leave the hulls on and arrange them in a circle on individual plates around a cone of sugar. Visitors to Jasper National Park, which is Canada's largest and finest national playground, situated in the heart of the Rocky Mountains, have a splendid opportunity of studying the habits of wild animals. For Jasper National Park is a game sanctuary in the finest sense of the word, and guns and hunting dogs are forbidden within its boundaries. It is of interest to observe the manner in which the animals recognize this. Though it is only comparatively few years since this great sanctuary was set aside, the shy deer and mountain sheep are no longer shy, the black and brown bears have become daily visitors to village and hotel grounds, and the animal population of the park is increasing by leaps and bounds.

However, it is Bruin who demonstrates perhaps most forcibly, how the animals have come to regard man as

their friend instead of as their enemy. Now it is a daily event to have one or more bears visit the Lodge grounds in search of the titbits which they know tourists love to feed to them. Nor is it unusual for a golfer playing over the magnificent scenic course which has been laid out in the Athabasca Valley, to meet a bear at the turn of the fairway, or to find a shy deer viewing him with interest as he gets down to line up his putt on one or another of the greens.

A short time ago, it was estimated that the mountain sheep population of this 5,300 square mile national park was over 10,000, with an equal number of deer, while the bears are numbered in thousands and are seen at almost any turn of the road. And when once a bear cub has developed a taste for sugar, he is a confirmed visitor to the Lodge grounds.—Canadian Railways photograph.

English Police Get Glowing Tributes

With Only a Shred of Evidence, Two Malefactors Are Brought to Justice

London.—Remarkable tributes to English police efficiency and the speedy detection and apprehension of criminals was paid by the press, following Mr. Justice Avory's sentencing the two slayers of Constable Gutteridge, who was shot down in the performance of his duty. The crime was committed by motor-car thieves in the darkness of a lonely country road on Sept. 27.

No one was arrested for many months. Scotland Yard, with only a shred of evidence to guide them, arrested the suspects on Jan. 20, and, step by step, built up a conclusive case. The jury quickly found them both guilty after a five-day trial and the court imposed the extreme penalty, thus ending what The Times leader characterizes as "the most remarkable trial for murder in recent years. . . . In no case within living memory have the police shown more ability in the detection of obscure and apparently inexplicable crimes. . . . "Convictions obtained at a long interval after a crime has been committed are of special value for the protection of society. They bring home to the most undesirable criminals that the arm of the law is long and escape from arrest and from suspicion for many months cannot free them from the haunting dread that retribution will reach them in the end."

Germany Builds New Ports for Air Traffic

Berlin.—The month of March saw 1,430 airplanes start from or land at the great Tempelhof airport in Berlin, carrying 3,239 passengers and almost thirty-four tons of baggage, freight and post. Air travel is increasing steadily from all German stations, compelling everywhere a corresponding enlarging of existing ports and the creation of new ones. The present landing place on the Oberwiesenfeld in the northwestern part of Munich, comprising about 200 acres, is being transformed into a modern airport. Air traffic in Silesia is also making great strides, and the coming summer will see eight lines in operation.

Announcements of participation in the "Ita," the great international air traffic exposition to be held in Berlin from October 7 to 28, have been received from so many countries, including the United States, that the two great auto halls on the exposition grounds will not be large enough to contain all the exhibits, and it will be necessary to use a third great hall which is now being built. The exposition will be by far the greatest of its kind ever held.

How Much Water Should Baby Get? A Famous Authority's Rule

An eight pound baby, for instance, needs twenty-four ounces of fluid. Later on the rule is two ounces of fluid per pound of body weight. Telephone Service Slow; Chinese Wreck Exchange

Verbal abuse of telephone "centrals" when connections are not forthcoming is for General Li Yunchang as inadequate way to express exasperation.

This war lord, who commands the 35th Division of General Chu Yu-pu's ill-disciplined Chihli army, had trouble getting a connection through the Tientsin head office exchange. After exhausting a stock of expletives learned in the rugged Shantung Mountains General Li sent soldiers of his bodyguard to the exchange to show that he was not to be trifled with. The soldiers assaulted several Chinese operators, smashed equipment and interrupted service for more than three hours of a busy afternoon.

The exchange is in Chinese territory just outside the boundary of the Italian concession, but it serves a large portion of the foreign areas. The Chinese operators could not be persuaded to return to their posts until the company's foreign engineers arrived, took charge and made the necessary repairs.

Dictator Chang Tso-lin at Peking has ordered an investigation of the affair.

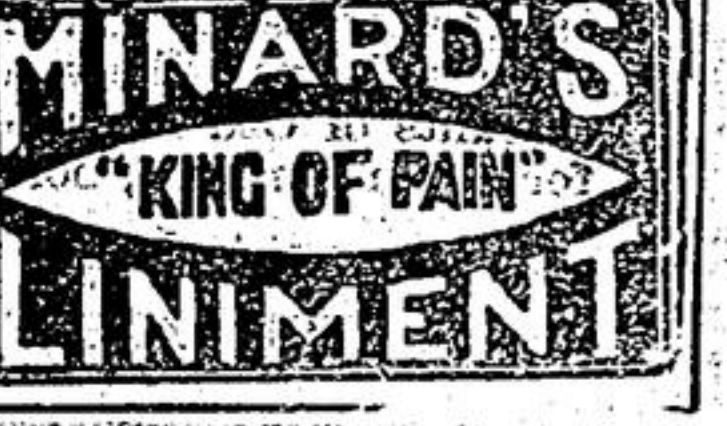
