MATCHES NEARLY CREATE BIG FIRES

Joseph Reesor's Barn Narrowly Escapes

Evidently the 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Reesor living on the 9th concession of Markham, a mile and a quarter south of Ringwood, doesn't believe in hiding his light under a bushel, for when he got hold of some matches in the home last Friday shortly after dinner hour, he went forth and set fire to the large straw stack situated within a few feet of the large barn, and for a time the big structure was in danger of being consumed by the flames. When the blaze was noticed by the elder people the telephone was used to summon the neighbors who responded promptly, also the fire truck at Unionville, which arrived on the scene within 20 minutes, and as the water supply was then exhausted, the chemical apparatus saved the situation, and soon smothered the blaze. Fortunately the wind carried the blaze away from the building, otherwise the whole place would have been enflamed before any assistance could have reached it.

As it was, even a portion of the straw stack was saved, and little boy Reesor has learned a lesson in matchology that will remain with him until Gabriel blows his great trumpet.

On May 24th some people tried lighting a fire in Mr. Geo. Collard's bush at Gormley, with equally disastrous results. Probably five or more acres of bush land was run over by the fire, which was stopped by the splendid effort put forth by Mr. Collard and some men and women motorists who happened along at the right time. Fortunately no big timber was damaged, but hundreds of young saplings were burned off as a result.

The exact origin of this bush fire is not known, but it is surmised that holiday seekers from the city motored into the woods, and attempted to boil water in a kettle or cook food without putting out the fire when finished. This is one of the pests that beset the owners of timber limits in the northern country, and the wonder is that people can be found so ignorant after all that has been said and written about starting fires in the bush.

WEED INSPECTORS MEET

A meeting of the Weed Inspectors representing the Municipalities of York County, will be held at the Dept. of Agriculture, Newmarket at 1.15 p.m. standard time on Tuesday, June 5th. The object of this meeting is to interpret the Act as it now reads, to the Inspectors. Mr. Lennox of the Dominion Seed Branch will be the official in charge. Since the Act has been changed this year all the new clauses will be explained and the more harmful weeds will be shown to the Inspectors.

LIFELONG CITIZEN IS LAID TO REST

One of the old pioneers of Whitchurch Township in the person of Jacob Fockler passed away on May 24th, 1928, at his residence in Stouffville. The funeral service was held in the Bloomington Christian Church on Saturday. The service was in charge of Rev. E. Morton, the pastor assisted by Rev. D. V. VanNorman of Keswick and Dr. W. P. Fletcher of Oshawa.

Mr. Fockler was born on the homestead at Bloomington 87 years ago, remaining there 58 years. He was active in church and school affairs. Thirty years ago he retired from the farm to his home in Stouffville where he continued his interest in local affairs, serving a few years ago in the Stouffville council. If he lived until September 20th next, he and his companion would have celebrated the 60th anniversary of their wedding day.

He leaves a widow and three sons: William A. on the homestead, Hilliard H. of Toronto and Rev. Chas. E. of Keswick.

Council met on Saturday at Goodwood. Reeve Chas. Lee presided, and members were all present.

Globe Indemnity Co. notified council they had settled the damage case with D. B. Taylor, paying him \$75 for the loss of his horse.

The Minister of Agriculture advised council of necessity of a weed inspector, also stating that the government grant may be withheld councils neglect to cut the weeds.

Mr. John Norton, presented a petition to the council signed by 250 ratepayers of the municipality, praying council to open up the balance of side-lots 10-11; con. 3, known as White sidelot.

Clerk was instructed to purchase six road drags. Clerk was also instructed by council to procure the services of an engineer from the Dept. of Highways to go over side-lots 10-11, con. 3, and get an estimate of cost of opening same.

A communication was also received from A. E. Christian, County Clerk, stating one Mrs. Ottinae Rowsell, had been admitted to the General Hospital, Whitby, and if she was a resident of this municipality.
