are going or coming, and thus many
people make other arrangements for
transportation.

Following ill health for some time
and ending in a stroke on Monday,
July 2nd, death claimed Mrs. Wm.
Hodgins, early Tuesday morning, at
the home of her son, Mr. J. R. Hod-
gins, C.N.R. agent here. A short
funeral service was held at the late
home Wednesday morning, and the
remains taken on the 11 train for
interment at Thornton, Simcoe
County. The deceased, whose maiden
name was Emma Powers, was born
in Simcoe County 66 years ago. Her
husband predeceased her 15 years,
having died here also at the home
of his son. Two children survive,
John R. and Miss Vina Hodgins. The
late Mrs. Hodgins was a Methodist
prior to church union, and the ser-
vice at the home on Wednesday was
conducted by Rev. H. S. Warren.

Death came with startling sudden-
ness to Mrs. Wm. J. Morden
on Friday evening, following only a
short illness, which was not consid-
ered to be at all serious. Mrs. Mor-
den was suddenly seized with a stroke
and before medical aid could reach
her, she had passed away. Born at
Ballantrae 75 years ago, she was a
daughter of the late Robt. Armstrong
one of the early pioneers in the sec-
tion, having cleared the farm just
south of the village where now lives
Mr. E. J. Cable. Following her mar-
riage to Wm. Morden they located at
Lincolntonville where they farmed on
the Slack property. Ten years ago
they moved to Stouffville, where Mr.
Morden died six years ago. At one
time Mrs. Morden was identified
with the old church at Lincolntonville,
now discontinued, and taught a Sun-
day school class there. She is sur-
vived by an only son, Wilfrid E. of
Stouffville, and by one brother, Robt.
Armstrong of Olds, Alberta. The
funeral on Sunday afternoon took
place to Stouffville cemetery, the
divine service being in charge of her
pastor, Rev. E. Morton of the Chris-
tian church. The pall bearers were:
Messrs. Andrew Graham, Sam Ho-
over, Robt. Brown, Noah Baker, Irwin
Gray and Goo. T. Lee. The floral tri-
butes were numerous and very beau-
tiful, and the attendance at the
funeral was unusually large, there
being a wide circle of friends and
relatives present from outside points.

week, Martha Sheffield, relict of the
late James Watson, former residents

Dowsell, and Mr. William Watson
of Stouffville, and David Watson of
Goodwood. She is survived by two
sons at home, and one daughter a
resident of Manitoba. There also
survives two brothers, Messrs. Isaac
and Emerson Sheffield undertakers
at Dodsland, Sask., and one sister
Mrs. Bert Lehman of Saskatoon.
Her husband predeceased her nine
years. The Sheffield brothers are
well remembered in Stouffville Isaac
having visited here last year. The
Sheffield family at one time lived in
the east end in the house now oc-
cupied by Mr. Lud. Hoover.

A resident in Stouffville for the
past year, Rev. George Arthur Bains-
borough passed away at his home
on the 10th concession south, on Sun-
day evening, following a protracted
illness. He had been confined to his
bed since April. The funeral on
Tuesday afternoon took place to
Stouffville cemetery, the service being
in charge of Rev. H. S. Warren
and Rev. E. Morton, the latter being
an uncle to the bereaved widow.
The late Mr. Bainsborough was 53
years of age, and for twenty years
had served faithfully as a Methodist
pastor on the charges at Gore Bay,
Englehart, Faigrove, and three sta-
tions in Muskoka, the latter being
at Wallers' Falls, where he fell per-
manently ill, and was forced to re-
tire.

A man of fine sterling character
he enjoyed many friends in the min-
istry who did not forget him in
trouble. Born in Lincolnshire, Eng-
land, he came to Canada 23 years
ago as a young man skilled in the
bookbinding trade, which he forsook
for the higher calling. He united in
marriage with Annie A. P. Morton,
an Ontario girl, at Toronto, and to
them were born three children, Ray-
mond aged 10 years, Willard 8 years,
and Emerson 6 years, all of whom
survive a beloved father together
with a bereaved wife.

Only a few weeks ago the parents
of deceased Councillor and Mrs.
Bainsborough arrived here from the
Old Land to visit their son, and they
were with him when the end came
during the twilight hour on Sunday.
