BURGLARS AT MARKHAM

Burglars were busy in Markham village on Wednesday night last week, the post office, C.N.R. station and Reesor's mill office at the station all being entered. All told it is thought the booty secured did not exceed \$120 or \$150.

It is thought the burglars were on the job between 12 and 1:30 a.m. as about half past twelve J. M. Whicker who lives across the street from the post office was awakened and heard a noise as of a door slamming.

Entrance to the post office was gained by jumping a window on the north east corner, which gave egress to the back hallway. The lock on the office door was then also forced by jamming the lock bolt catch which was torn off.

Here the burglars rifled the cash drawer of some \$6 in coppers and a dollar or two in loose postage stamps and postcards. They also started to open the general delivery letters, but finding this would take time they carried off the balance of the letters. They also took a parcel from Eaton's directed to Jos. Pagnello of Box Grove, which they evidently opened outside, as the contents, children's underwear, were found on Dr. Hore's lawn across the road on Franklin street.

At Reesor's Mill, the doors of the mill were forced but nothing in the mill is missing. The office window was tried but unable to force it the glass in the door was broken and entrance gained by reaching through and opening the night latch. Change to the amount of \$5 or \$6 was taken from the safe which was not locked, but postage stamps were left undisturbed. This is the second time the mill office has been burglarized, the first time about four years ago when the safe was blown.

At the railway station entrance was gained by breaking a front window pane and opening the catch. So far as the agent, Mr. Snider, could tell nothing is missing.—Economist.

Through the instrumentality of Mr. C. B. Morgan of Toronto, one of the cottagers at the lake, a modern life saving outfit is now hung at the pavilion, ready for any emergency. The outfit consists of two water drags and two poles, the use of which some day may save a life, and will at least save time in recovering a body. The absence of such an outfit a couple of years ago, caused a delay of two days in recovering a body.

Mr. Morgan has caused a subscription list to be passed around among the cottagers, and as all or nearly all contributed a little, the dragging outfit was made possible. Mr. Morgan is designated the chief of the coast guard, and thanks are due him for his interest in the matter, which has filled a long-felt necessity.
