**HIGHER CATTLE PRICES STILL**

The editor of the Chesley Enterprise who at one time was associated with the editor of the Tribune in the newspaper business, gives the following interview with Hon. Duncan Marshall who was in Chesley on Saturday evening and remarked that he has been questioned by a few farmers about the story in the Toronto Globe to the effect that 35,000 cattle had been recently shipped from the Argentine Republic to the United States and that more would likely follow with a possible result of breaking the market.

Mr. Marshall pointed out that no live stock could be shipped from the Argentine to the United States, Canada or Great Britain and that this report was only a farce. For some 20 years the Argentine has been so full of foot and mouth disease that their cattle have not been permitted to enter any country where cattle diseases are being kept under control. Consequently no cattle have come or will come to the United States from the Argentine.

It is interesting to also note here that Argentine chilled beef has been prohibited from entering the United States on the ground that it might carry germs of that dreaded cattle scourge, foot and mouth disease. Great Britain is carrying on a scientific investigation at the present time with a view to determining whether or not the bones of chilled meat may carry disease germs of this kind and a strong agitation is on in the Old Country to prohibit the entry of chilled meat from the Argentine into Great Britain. This matter had been taken up actively, Mr. Marshall said, after the discovery in 1926 that foot and mouth disease had been brought into Scotland by an importation of dead pigs from Holland. Hogs are not now admitted from Holland unless in the form of cured pork.

The idea of live cattle coming from the Argentine to the United States Mr. Marshall says is simply grotesque. As one of the men who negotiated the removal of the British Embargo from Canadian cattle Duncan Marshall has a very comprehensive knowledge of the "Health of Animals" regulations governing the shipment of cattle in all the countries of the world.

He also remarked that, in conversation with Hon. Chas. Stewart, Minister of the Interior, the other day, Mr. Stewart stated that in his recent trip through the West the absence of cattle was apparent everywhere. There are, he said apparently no cattle in the country. Mr. Marshall expressed the opinion that we are now in a four or five year period of good stiff prices for cattle, and next spring, looked almost like war prices.
