NOTES AND COMMENTS

After all we wouldn't swap our cold winters for those tropical hurricanes.

It looks as if the investigation into the wreck of the Manasoo which crumpled up and went down in the waters of Georgian Bay should have been done some time ago. W. R. Urquhart, an old Stouffville boy, is one of the jurymen seeking a solution of the mystery.

Rural mail services in Canada are steadily increasing. A maximum of 3,800 rural routes has now been reached this representing an increase of about 400 compared with a year ago. The most notable development is in the western provinces, more demands coming from there than from other sections of the country.

The new act governing auto trucks needs amending. Under the regulations both trucks (Morden and Lehman) doing business between Stouffville and Toronto, are required to carry \$3500 insurance on the cargo they haul. As their average load would not be worth \$500, and never have they had a load worth \$3,500, the figures should be modified to conform to the value their trucks might possibly have on at any one time.

The curb gas pump is adding to traffic congestion in many towns and is proving a vexatious problem. The Provincial authorities have now decreed that municipal bodies which granted licenses to operate pumps on the curbs have done so illegally. The Town Council of Simcoe was recently notified to this effect and forthwith not only refused an application for licenses, but cancelled all the permits that had been granted in the past, throwing all responsibility for the pumps on their owners.
