THE LATE MRS. KING

Although a month has passed since we reported the death in these columns of the late Mrs. King of Okotoks, Sask., sister to Mrs. M. Cook of Lemonville and Mr. W. B. Sanders of Stouffville, probably it is not too late to reprint the death notice which appeared in the Okotoks Review, which is just to hand. It says:
The Review regrets to record the death of Mrs. Fanny Elizabeth King who passed away at the home of her son A. B. King, mgr. of the Royal Bank, on Saturday, Oct. 27th. She had been in poor health for the last 18 months and which had grown acute during the last two. Her daughter Mrs. G. A. Brooks of Toronto, a trained nurse, arrived here six or seven weeks ago and has been looking after her since.

The late Mrs. King was born in Devonshire, England, 70 years ago and came from there to Barrie, Ont. where she was married at the age of 24 to Egerton W. King, publisher of the Barrie Gazette. When he died nine years later leaving her with four little children, she opened up in the store business for herself and succeeded by her energy and perseverance in raising and educating her children to be a credit to both her and themselves. Since her son came here 10 years ago, with the exception of short visits to other children, she has lived here practically all the time and has made hosts of friends who sincerely mourn her loss and sympathize with her children in their great loss.

She leaves two sons and two daughters. The daughter who was unable to be present was Mrs. A. E. Stewart of Saskatoon. She is also survived by one sister Mrs. M. Cook of Stouffville, and three brothers, W. B. Sanders of Stouffville, H. P. of Allandale, and T. P. of California.
At the deceased's own request interment was made in Okotoks with a special steel outer box so that if it is desired at some future date it can be taken east.

The funeral was held from the United Church on Tuesday, Rev. W. J. Kidd conducting the services. The church was crowded and there was a full choir.

Rev. W. J. Kidd gave a short but very feeling address telling of his own long friendship with the deceased lady, his admiration for her beautiful christian character and the patient uncomplaining manner in which she had borne her long sufferings. He also told of her early trouble and how bravely she had met them when left a widow at the age of 33, she had gone to work and succeeded in raising four small children to manhood and womanhood and giving them a start in the world.
Among the friends from distance points who attended the funeral included W. M. Chandler assistant supervisor of the Royal Bank, who is a former bank manager at Stouffville also P. C. Dougherty of Brant, Alta., a brother-in-law of the Misses Daley of Stouffville.
